


From Our House to the Synod House



In the March 2015 Newsletter, we listed all of our special monthly benevolence offerings for this year. The month of August was designated for the Montana Synod House. If you are not yet familiar with this project, here is one paragraph from a brochure called the Synod House Case Statement.

"The Montana Synod Assembly has voted (in 2009, and in 2013) to build a new Synod House, as a center for mission for the congregations and ministries of the Montana Synod. The current building, built in the 1970's, is no longer adequate for today's and tomorrow's needs. A task force studied options including remodeling, re-locating and building on the other end of the lot that we already own. There conclusion was to build. The Synod House is not an end in itself. It is a means by which we can do ministry together."

Individuals and congregations from the Montana Synod have been asked to help support the Capital Fund which is seeking to raise 1.2 million dollars to complete the project. That amount includes a biblical tithe that 10% of our gifts will go to our Mission Venture Capital Fund, which will be used for grants to new and innovative ministries within our partnering synod congregations.

Pastor Mark and President of the Congregation, Kristianne Wilson, discussed our contribution to this project. We are suggesting an alternative to the August Special Offering. We will receive a special offering in August for our Food Pantry and at the same time begin a mini fundraising campaign called "From Our House to the Synod House." What we are proposing is that between now and November, individuals, families, and groups within the congregation, think of ways that they can raise money to donate to the Synod House. Here are a couple of examples:

Do you have extra garden produce (like all those zucchinis)? Head to the Farmer's Market in Huntley, sell them and donate the money to the Synod House. Or maybe you purchase something new for your house, say a new couch. Sell your old one and donate the money. Perhaps you can make a quilt or some other craft, sell it and donate the money.

We would then bring our offerings to Worship on November 8th. On that Sunday, Jeanne McCoskery, the Synod Campaign Coordinator will be with us to receive the offering land let us know how the Synod House project is coming along.

Use your imaginations and we can make a wonder gift from Our House to the Synod House!

I've received some feedback that I have been picking some unfamiliar hymns. While I think learning new hymns is a good thing, I also don't want to frustrate you with worship music you don't know. Every congregation seems to have a collection of hymns they know and have sung for many years. Every congregation's collection is different. Hymns I am familiar with and grew up

with and think everybody knows, may be unfamiliar to you. One solution is to get some help choosing hymns. I try to choose hymns that relate to the theme of the day. If you have some familiar hymns you would like to sing, let me know and I will try to work them in.

I also discussed our liturgy with the Council. Their feeling was that if I want to add or subtract some elements of the liturgy I could go ahead and to that. This fall we may try some different things. Please give me your feedback.

The final thing I discussed with the Council in regards to worship if our frequency of communion. For many years now congregations have been encouraged to return to the historical practice of offering the sacrament at every service. The Council would like congregational member to think about this and then have a discussion about it at our Annual Meeting in January. Since we are in John's gospel and reading the Bread of Life discourse from chapter 6 through Sunday, August 23rd, I have decided that we will have communion on each of those Sundays in August. This will give us a little taste of what it is like to feast on the Bread of Life each week.



CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING July 8, 2015

The Church Council met after the Wednesday evening BBQ, with 8 members present. Pastor Mark opened the meeting with devotions and a Bible study from "Opening the 'L' Word".

Pastor's Report: Pastor said we are getting returns from the Membership Information surveys, which are being recorded. He also said that Pastor Kelly Addy from Huntley Methodist Church, will soon be leaving and taking a job in the Flathead Lake Area. There will be a combined church service in Barkemeyer Park at Huntley on Sunday, August 2nd, with a potluck to Church follow the services. Pastor has been doing regular visits to the nursing homes. He Council Minutes has begun planning for Sunday School this fall, also for a Confirmation class. . He will be gone on Sunday, July 19th, to perform the baptism of his granddaughter up at Seeley Lake. Dawn Petty will fill in for him at the worship service.

Treasurer's Report: The weekly offerings have been holding steady for the summer months. She reported on the special offerings taken so far this year, and that is working well. At this point, in January, \$421.00 was taken in for Prison Bibles; February the offering for Lutheran World Relief totaled \$176.75; in March, \$91.61 was taken in for St. John's Ministries; in April, the Family Promise Group took in \$116.00; and in May, the Youth Ministries gathered \$361.00.. The Youth Fundraising projects and the amounts raised are as follows: sub sandwiches for Super Bowl Day, \$564.50; Easter Breakfast was \$218.00; and the spaghetti dinner totaled \$590.00. The June Garage Sale brought in \$963.63, (Thrivent no longer matches the fundraising) which goes to the Building Fund. The funds received from the summer community BBQ's is going into the food pantry. The Treaurer's report was accepted as printed, and held for audit.

Secretary: The minutes were approved as printed.

The Deacons Report: a thank you will be sent to Norm Haaland for the donation of hamburger for the

BBQ'a, and a thank you to Project Meat for the generous discount given on the purchase of the hamburger patties. The program "God's Work, our Hands" project for Sept. 13th was discussed, and a suggestion was made to see some of the Lions' Club members about helping with the building of the community center. Bob Fritz and Matt Beddes are going to be contacted before our August council meeting to get some ideas of where we could help.

The problem with the persistent bats was discussed, and Terri Hensley will either get the plans to build one, or she will buy a completed one. The Family Promise hostesses from Emmanuel for this rotation

included Terri, Dawn Petty, Jenny Ingram and Kristianne Wilson. The next rotation will be in 10 or 12 weeks.

The Trustees' Report: David Nelson reported that he and his family wlll be moving to North Dakota, to the Hillsboro area, but he will be here for several months more. He also said that the monies donated to the Youth Gathering from our

Women's Group, were turned over to Pastor Asselstine, who will take it to the convention.

In a report on the status of the garage remodel, into a food pantry, that was our first priority. He did say that he heard the parsonage was to be moved down to the "project" area.

Old Business: Once the parsonage is moved, a letter will be sent to members about the amount of monies in the building fund, what activities are needed to be completed in renovating the garage, etc. to keep our members updated on this process. More detailed plans about the parsonage replacement with be discussed at our annual meeting in January 2016.

New Business:

The Council Retreat is tentatively set for September 18th and 19th, and the agenda includes reviewing our missions and vision, need for additional church policies, and setting longer term goals. A "draft" agenda for this retreat will be brought to the August Council meeting. We plan to have group discussion and feedback on the pastoral evaluation at the


