Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

I don't know if you saw the picture posted a couple of

weeks ago on our Facebook page. It was a quote from Martin Luther: "Our Lord has written the promise of resurrection, not in books alone, but in every leaf of springtime."

PASTOR'S

Right now, following some nice rain and warm temperatures the leaves outside are shouting RESURRECTION! As with Christmas. Easter is not one day, but a whole season. We remain in the Easter Season until May 17<sup>th</sup> this year—the Day of Pentecost. Of course, the resurrection of Jesus isn't just about one day or one season, it's about every day. In Jesus resurrection, we are being made new every day, as the Apostle Paul writes: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2 Corinthians 5:17) That is why I love the change of seasons so much, it reminds me that everything is renewed by God and that things are constantly changing. Even fall and winter—as the leaves fall and the grass turns brown, as the crops are harvested and the creation goes to sleep—whisper that spring will come again! The creation can help but shout: "RESURRECTION!"

It is interesting then, that we avoid and fear change so much. I think we fear change because we become comfortable with the old, comfortable with the way things are and we want them to remain that say, even when "the way

things are" or "the way things were" might not really be so good. We allow ourselves to be deceived and resist the new life that Jesus wants to give us. That's why addictions are so hard to overcome, because even though the addiction may be literally taking our life away, we can't image living a new life without the addiction. In refusing to change, we choose often the old and familiar and ultimately we choose death.

Our faith, however tells us something different. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God is wanting to make us new every day. God wants to give us a new life, an abundant life! The leaves of springtime shout it!

The seasons are changing. Spring will soon become summer. Easter; the season of the resurrection will soon become Pentecost; the season of the Holy Spirit and the season of growth. I can't wait! "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" How about that for a change?



## CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING April 15, 2015

The Council met on Wednesday evening, April 15th, at the church with nine members present.

Pastor Mark lead devotions from the book "Reclaiming the "L" Word: Renewing the Church From its Lutheran Core", which we will continue using before each meeting.

Pastor's Report included the Lenten services:
Wednesday night soup suppers, Passover Dinner,
Good Friday Services, Easter Sunrise
Service, and 10:00 AM Worship. He
officiated at two funerals this past month:
Fred George and Larry Bengtson. He has
done numerous visits to the hospitals
checking on members who have had
medical problems. Pastor has also posted
several pictures from Holy Week services
on our Facebook page.

Confirmation will be held on May 10th for a class of 4 young people. Stoles will be needed for that day, and Kristianne has graciously offered to make them. The confirmands will be measured for the length of their stoles on Sunday, the 26th, during the class session.

Pastor wants to update the church directory and have it reprinted and bound. We need to know who considers themselves members, even if they are not attending services, and get their e-mail addresses and phone numbers.

Pastor explained the "Shepherd's Staff", a data base software program from Concordia to improve our church records retention and for parochial reports. Sharon made a motion to purchase this material, seconded by Terri, and the motion was passed.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's report was accepted as printed.

Deacons: The Food Pantry is doing well. We will again receive food from the Billings Food Bank at the end of April....it averages about every 8 to 12 weeks

that we can go in to pick up their surplus. The Deacons will also make a recommendation for the project "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday, which is scheduled for September 13th.

Trustees: They are working on plans to convert part of the garage into the Food Pantry. One overhead garage door will be removed and replaced with regular entry doors. The furnace, hot water heater, and well pump need to be removed from the parsonage and installed in the garage in the Food Pantry area. They are getting prices on siding and roofing and the partition wall, and plan to do most of the work themselves with help

from the congregation. Matt is still talking to Ostermiller House Movers about removal of the parsonage. Terri Hensley reminded them that once the parsonage is removed, the bats in the attic will find ano there place to go, and if we don't put up some "bat houses" for them, they will attempt getting into the church attic. David

suggested putting one on the new security light pole.

Secretary: The minutes from the previous meeting were accepted as printed.

> Old Business: We need to discuss the pledges made for the building fund, and remind people to continue to give for this purpose, so we will have the funding when it is necessary to put up a new parsonage. It was decided to discuss that at the end of the summer.

> Additional ways to generate additional member participation in the host responsibilities for the Family Promise program were discussed. Dawn Petty and Laurel Noland will co-chair this program.

The Youth fundraiser will be held on May 3rd after worship services. There will be a spaghetti dinner which will have a free will offering for the meal, and then there will be a quilt auction. David reported that the free will offering at the Easter breakfast took in over \$200.00. The Youth are raising money for a trip to Detroit from July 10th to the 19th for the National Youth Convention.



## SPRING

Make this beautiful craft to remind you of God's gift of new life at springtime.



#### What you need:

- White 11" x 17" paper
- Acrylic paint (various spring colors, including green)
- Paintbrush
- Empty two-liter plastic bottle
- Paper plates
- Paper towels

#### What you do:

- 1. With the paper placed vertically, paint stems and leaves with green paint.
- Pour a different color of paint onto a paper plate.
   Then place the bottom of the bottle into the paint.
- 3. Using the bottle as a stamp, press it onto the paper to create a flower atop a green stem.
- 4. Repeat with different colors on different plates, cleaning the bottle each time, to create a beautiful spring bouquet.
