CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING September, 2015

The church council met on Wednesday evening, September 16th, for a brief meeting. In attendance were Pastor Mark, Kristianne Wilson, Sharon Wolske, Liz White, Matt Walsh and Dawn Petty. Devotions were led by Pastor Mark with discussions on "Proclaiming the 'L' Word".

The business agenda began with standing reports:

Secretary's minutes were approved as printed.

Treasurer's report was reviewed, showing less offering for the summer months due to lower attendance at the services. Pastor reported that there will be an annual fee for the chair lift inspec-

tions of \$100.00 plus the yearly license amount of \$90.00. Liz made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report, seconded by Matt, and it was passed.

Deacons' report: Various ideas to raise monies for the "Our House to the Synod House" campaign were mentioned: recycling aluminum cans and other metal objects, raffles, selling hand made items, etc. Jeanne McCoskery, the Synod House Campaign Coordinator, will be with us on Sunday, November 8th to update the congregation about the campaign and answer questions about the plans for a larger building for offices, receptions and storage space. We will also present her our financial gifts on that Sunday.

Trustees Report: we need to inform the congregation regarding the removal of the parsonage this fall. There is a buyer for the parsonage, and a down payment has been made. Some workers from Ostermiller House Movers have been doing some preparation work before the parsonage can be moved. Now we must begin work on the garage and get it ready to have the Food Pantry moved into half of that building. More detailed information about replacing the parsonage will be given out at the annual meeting of the congregation.

Pastor's Report: Pastor has been very active in attending the Community events, such as the weekly Senior Citizens luncheons and the summer BBQ's which are now ended for this year. He does the hospital visitations, and works as a chaplain at St. Vincent's several nights of the week. He has just returned from the board meeting at PLU, and will be going to Great Falls for a seminar on September 24th and the Bishop's Convocation on September 25th and 26th. The confirmation class



this year will be small, with two or three young people. He will be attending the Luther Lectures at Chico on October 22nd and 23rd. Pator reported that Terri Hensley stopped in his office this afternoon and gave him is resignation from Council. She called during the meeting to speak with the Council over speaker

phone and explain her reason for resigning. It has to do with some policies of the ELCA.

Old Business: Sharon reported that she will contact someone about the problem with getting the sanctuary windows open and closed. Kristianne is waiting to hear back from a Shepherd School representative about school supplies that may be needed by some of the youth.

New Business: Kristianne and Pastor will compose a letter that will be mailed to members of the congregation regarding the status of the parsonage removal, replacement, parking area and food pantry site.

The Pastoral Evaluation forms given to the council members have been returned and summarized. A discussion was held and we were able to give him very constructive feedback. The Council had no problems with his performance. The Council will be attending a retreat on Friday evening the 18th of September at the Wilson's home, and continuing on Saturday morning, the 18th at the church.

CONTINUING EDUCATION and LIFELONG LEARNING

The Lutheran Church has always valued education, both for its clergy and for its laity. Martin Luther was a professor who advocated not only a learned ministry, but also a well-informed laity. Lutheran congregations are centers of learning and mission. NRIT assists congregations in their teaching of the faith. NRIT offers courses and events that are specifically geared to the congregational level. NRIT offers courses that help the teachers and pastoral leaders of the church in their teaching role. All NRIT courses are open to everyone. If you have any question about a course, contact us.

ELCA pastors, AIMs and diaconal ministers (rostered people) are expected to do 50 hours of continuing theological education annually. As part of the compensation package, congregations are asked to grant two weeks of time for continuing education annually, in addition to funding. This time is not vacation, and the money is not the same as a book allowance. Congregations are encouraged to work with the pastor / AIM / diaconal minister and the synod to provide opportunities for sabbatical, as well.

NRIT is the Montana Synod's program ministry for clergy and laity, and is accountable to the church. We love to work with you to help put on programs, bring in speakers, address the issues that are at the heart of your community. We are your ministry.
