Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

Assembly in this newsletter.

As I write this, I am fresh off our Montana Synod Assembly held in Billings this year. The Synod Assembly theme was Deepen Faith and Witness—this is one of our Bishop's Benchmarks for the Synod. This assembly was also our Theological Conference and we had workshops dealing with this Benchmark. You can read more about this is Dawn Petty's Report on the Synod

I would like to share some information about a process that the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA, Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, has called our church to engage in this year. It is called: Called Together in Christ. This process is designed to help the leaders of our church make decisions about the future identity, direction and priorities of the ELCA. It involves three main stages:

- Having a conversation across this church about the future
- Consulting on directions and priorities that emerge
- Reaching decisions as a church about where we are headed.

The conversation stage is about the wrap up in July. The conversations are taking place in congregations, synods, and among the churchwide staff. I have been posting the questions that we as members of the congregation have been asked to consider on our Emmanuel Facebook Page. I encourage to look at them and make a response through the Facebook page. The questions are these:

- What are your hopes for the future of this church?
- What drew you to this congregation and what helps you feel connected?
- What important things should this church do in the future — in your community and in the world?

• Who would you like to see joining your congregation, and how might this happen?

- What are the two biggest challenges facing your church right now? Do you have any ideas to address these issues and move us forward?
- ELCA is a church of more than 9,000 congregations, with a presence across the U.S. and the world. What would you like to know about the wider church?

Our individual responses are important and will be catalogued analyzed and lead to a paper to be released in July to let everyone know the main messages coming through, and to share some options for the future that can be test through further consultation in August and September. At this stage the ELCA will get more structured feedback from congregations, synods and ministries and the churchwide office before developing firm recommendations to the ELCA Church Council.

It is important that we participate in these conversations about the future of the ELCA and the future of our Congregation as well. The Emmanuel will be talking about the paper that comes out in July at our Council Planning Retreat in September. Please take advantage of giving your feedback to the larger church through our Facebook page or by going to the Called Forward Together in Christ web site at <u>elca.org/future</u>.

We had conversations on Saturday afternoon at the Synod Assembly using some similar questions and I found this process very helpful and enlightening.

God's Blessings as you help us contemplate the future of the ELCA and our Congregation—and enjoy the summer as well!

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 5/11/16

<u>Vision</u>: We will follow God's plan for us to grow in faith, family, and community.

<u>Mission</u>: ELC is a welcoming church, in a rural community, called by God to joyful worship, caring relationships, and loving service.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Pastor Mark, Kristianne, Sharon, Carol, Laurel, Matt, and Karen

DEVOTIONS: Pastor read a passage from a book by Frederick Buechner about Spirit and the word Spirituality. Being spiritual is highly contagious. Spirit = Breath = Life

SECRETARY: Minutes from April were corrected and approved as printed.

TREASURER: Motion was made to accept the financial report for April. Motion passed. Offering was down and

expenses were up due to the quarterly insurance payment. Yearly insurance premium will decrease by about \$500 with removal of the parsonage. We have about \$200 in the food pantry account and just had a couple hundred recently donated. Council agreed that the money raised this summer at the community BBQs will go toward the food pantry. Sharon will be talking with Sheryl Sandy of the Billings Food Bank regarding organizing the best hours for the pantry to be open.

DEACONS: Liz is still working on the backpack program but was not present to give an up-

date. Needing to follow up with Jill about Vacation Bible School. Need information and registration form or sign-up sheet for those interested. Matt will be talking to Adam Steadman with Berea Baptist to get the information. Their VBS is 6/27-7/1 from 5p-8p. Needing helpers to supervise and help with activities. Vista volunteer is on Facebook and can help with volunteers if needed.

TRUSTEES: Due to recent vandalism and church security, CAMERAS HAVE BEEN INSTALLED. One is located above the a/c in the window by the side entrance which shows part of the parking lot and the front doors. The other camera is located in the hallway above the door to the sanctuary and shows the stairwell and Pastor's office. The system purchased allows us to add 2 additional cameras, one of which will be installed on the garage once the food pantry is moved. Matt will purchase the additional cameras and install them. System records for 64 hours at a time but will only record when movement is detected. Works on Wi-Fi and can be connected to a smartphone which will help with monitoring. Council will update again in 2 months once there has been a chance to watch and review tapes and to see how everything is working. Matt added a striker plate on front door to make more secure. The parsonage is scheduled to be moved on the 26th. Waiting for power lines to be moved between Huntley and Worden so the house can be moved through that area. Rob Emmons will be the point of contact for Ostermiller as Matt will be out of town. Assuming the house is moved, the concrete people can start on 5/30. They are bringing a stump grinder with them and will take care of the stumps as well. Sharon will work with them to get the down payment for their services with the remainder being paid when complete. The well for the parsonage was filled when the house was moved. Discussion about having a new well installed so there is water to the garage/food pantry/garden but was nixed at this time. Will discuss at another time if a need arises. Garage cleanup and workday scheduled for 5/14 from 8am-12pm. Kristianne is working with the parents of the vandals to have them present for this cleanup project. Matt will have a trailer

and will go through the storage unit. Bill Green has donated a freezer that needs to be moved. The piles of debris in the yard will also be removed and additional garden space will be tilled up on the 14th.

PASTOR: Busy with senior meetings, premarital meetings, a baptism, and St John's annual meeting. Also had home visits with Ed Thaut prior to his funeral, which Pastor also officiated. Community BBQs start June 15th and still needing helpers. Talked to Chris Mackey with United Way and they have asked us to

participate in the ReadCycle Book Drive to keep kids reading through the summer. Last year we donated all children's books that were left after the garage sale and we will do that again this year. Would also accept donations at the church if anyone has children's books they would like to part with. Books should be appropriate for Kindergarten through ages 13-14. Wednesday 5/25, Dr Ira Byock MD will be at Petro Hall at MSU-Billings from 6:30-8:00 pm discussing the "4 Things That Matter Most" if anyone would like to attend. Officiating Linda Hinkle's granddaughter's wedding on 5/28 at Chauncey's Event Center and Talia Super's wedding in August at The Depot. Will be having Memorial Day Service on May 30th. **OLD BUSINESS:** Need to get a more accurate count on food pantry usage. Cameras will help assist in seeing how many come in and at what hours. Pantry will be locked on Saturdays by Kelly, who handles cleaning at the church. Willa Jean will be helping LuAnn with the alter cloth. The kids that vandalized the church will be giving 10 hours each of service to the church. Connie Halvorsen will help

with the kids and their time at the church with the garden and the BBQs. Will revisit member database in 2 months. Revisited the ELC User Policy and made some minor changes. A motion was made to accept the policy changes and the motion was carried. Usher duties were outlined and will be discussed at our next meeting. **NEW BUSINESS:** Lenten services and Ecumenical participation is down. Need to add this to our next congregational meeting or do a survey sheet to find what is preferred and to try and determine why attendance is low. The potluck and church service, first Sunday in August, at Barkemeyer Park is the one most attended by our congregation. Council has decided that we will be having our retreat September 16-17. Matt and Melissa would like to donate some playground equipment to the church and would like to have it installed by end of July. This will be discussed more at another meeting as will need to plan where and have the appropriate materials in place to install it. One of the Council responsibilities as per the bylaws is to make sure we have adequate insurance and that we have open discussion about it. Sharon spoke with our insurance agent through Street Brothers Insurance and shared the information with the council. Rich stated said that our insurance is good and that we have adequate coverage. Our liability coverage is good, we have ample coverage for Sexual Misconduct and Employee Practices (i.e. wrongful termination) and the addition of playground equipment should not be an issue.

LOVING SERVICE

Deepen Faith and Witness

The 2016 Synod assembly was held June 3rd through the 5th in Billings. Such a great learning experience! The Assembly had several brief business sessions, but there were many workshops and great speakers. This was the Theological Conference and the keynot speaker was Dr. Mary Jane Naemig, professor of Church history at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. She titles her first talk "Free, Free, Free . . . For what?" She expounded on "Freedom . . . From what? For What? So What?" The first (from what?) explained how in today's world all vocations are being constantly evaluated. Are we happy as we should be, are we as successful as we should be, etc.? Evaluation can be oppressive. In Luther's day, the medieval theology was that we should be as righteous as Jesus, because God keeps score. People feared displeasing God, even in their everyday lives. Grace was not enough, y ou had to work to be reconciled by God. Luther realized that "God gives it away" As power, wisdom, righteousness are all gifts from God and the result is freedom. We don't have to worry anymore about whether we are measuring up.

Free for What? For instance, we are frre to please our neighbor, we are perfectly gree to be dutiful servants of God. Just how do we please our neighbor? 1. Really listen to their needs. Really listen to someone whose opinion differs from ours. 2. Strive for a good relationship with our neighbor. Try new things. Take risks. "Sin Boldly." It is Freedom for neighborliness.

So What? We do not live for ourselves. We have the freedom for service—for relationships—we do not live for ourselves. Look, really look around, at your neighbors. What do they need? How can you help? We have the freedom to proclaim the



Gospel boldly. With our church involvement we are free people to live in God's world as God intended us to. It is God who intended we should be involved; in our church, in our world—as he commanded us, "Love Your neighbor."

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There were a number of workshops on the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. Twenty new Lay Pastoral Associates were recognized as completing the two year course. There

was the installation of newly elected Synod Council members and the ordination of Tonia Fischer.

Another very intriguing workshop was one on interesting young adults on becoming an active part of the congregation. Their religious beliefs, current trends, negative attitudes are all teaching us that the young people's image of church is not positive, not neutral, but quit negative—and we need to help them look at things differently.

Another interesting workshop was on Prison Ministry; conducted by Pastor Rob Nedbalek, the current chaplain at the Men's Prison in Deer Lodge. (Rob and his family were former members here at Emmanuel before he decided in mid-life to go on to the seminary and become a pastor.)

I would like to thank you for the opportunity for Jill Hoffman and I to be the delegates to the Assembly and to represent Emmanuel.


