Pastor's Christmas Message

Advent. I don't like seeing Christmas "stuff" going on sale in the stores immediately after Halloween. I don't like listening to Christmas music in stores beginning November 1st. I get really tired of watching those holiday car ads on the television and the jewelry ads that suggest real love is giving your sweetheart a really big diamond for Christmas. Don't even get me started on those annoying Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer and Frosty the Snowman cartoons. Okay, Scrooge it is!

As much as the commercialization of the Christmas season brings out my inner Dickens, I also get a little frustrated when people haul out their "Put Christ back into Christmas" memes and post them all over the social media. I didn't know that Christ had ever left Christmas. Yes, Jesus always has been and always be the reason for the season. (I can do trite clichés too!) Bah humbug!

With all this being said, Advent and Christmas remain beloved seasons of the Church Year for me. My tendency to be Scrooge doesn't really accomplish much other than raising my blood pressure—which doesn't really need any extra help. What's a Pastor Scrooge to do?

All of the other field mice Used to laugh and call him names. They wouldn't let the Church Mouse Play in all their cheesey games.


Then one foggy Christmas Eve, Santa made a strange request. "T.C., with your mind of wit, Won't you ride with me a bit?"

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 11/8/2017

Members present: Pastor Mark, Carol, Laurel, Wade, Kristianne, Karen, Randy, Liz, and Matt

SECRETARY: Approved as written.

TREASURER: Offering on Nov 5 was \$2147. Our housing allowance will be increasing by \$5000 next year. We still have about \$750 of the money that was donated for the renovation of the food pantry. Matt & Melissa Walsh made an in-kind donation of \$65 to purchase the remaining insulation needed to finish the pantry and then completed the insulation. Treasurer's report was approved as printed.

DEACONS: Nothing new to report.

TRUSTEES: Realtor box has been hung near the northeast corner of the pantry, so the pantry can be accessed if needed for donations. Wade has been checking on options for the sign board and found some that lock, are weatherproof, and would hold up to 4 regular sheets of paper. Cost for these boards range from \$100-200. Looking at options for fundraising for this project. Wade has a propane heater that hangs from the ceiling and will work areat for the pantry. Will be bringing it down to the church to make sure it works well. Needs a thermostat and will check on getting it installed. The trustees will begin to identify facility improvements and repair in a broader long term plan and then find ways to raise funds to accomplish these improvements and repairs.

PASTOR: Bishop's convocation, Aspen Meadows visits, funeral for Craig Wilson, senior and text meetings, joint worship service in Helena with Roman Catholics. Pastor has a friend that is working on his doctrine of ministry (he is also a hospice chaplain) and has a project called We Do Not Lose Heart. They are working with congregations and churches that are at risk. Pastor Mark has agreed to be on the board for this. No Thanksgiving service or Advent services this year as they are not well attended. December 17th is the Christmas program "Llama Christmas Drama." Christmas Eve is on Sunday this year and we will have normal Sunday worship as well as a Candlelight Service at 8 pm. Harvest Dinner, auction, and craft/bake sale went well. Fed 170 people which is less than normal but figuring the weather had a little to do with that. Total for the day was \$4,889.32 in which \$2,741 was the auction,

\$1,548 dinner, \$328 craft/bake sale, \$237 quilt raffle, and \$35 from the rubbish sale.

OLD BUSINESS: Need to finish the wiring and add a breaker box wire for the heater in the pantry. Matt and Melissa completed insulating the attic in the pantry, thank you. Laurel talked to Christian Helland with Helland Agency regarding our insurance. We currently have Guide One through Streeter Brothers which is the same program Helland Agency uses and they only do insurance for churches. Christian said we have some over lapping coverage and believes he would be able to save us some money. One way to help with our rate would be to change our deductible. A motion was made that we change our deductible to \$1000 and the motion carried. Will look in to getting proposals from both Streeter Brothers and Helland



Agency to see who can give us the best rate for Guide One. Kristianne will present the CCRC changes at the congregational meeting on 11/19.

NEW BUSINESS: Annual meeting will be January 28th after church so please plan to attend. Needing 3 voting members to work with Pastor Mark to fill the vacancies on council. Mark, Matt, Kristianne, and Randy will be meeting Monday 11/20 @ 4pm to discuss options and make suggestions for these vacancies. Laurel found a freestanding, wooden flip file display for our Confirmation pictures on the wall in the basement. The display cost is \$500, and a motion was made to spend some of the undesignated memorial

money on the display. The motion carried.
