CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 04/11/2018

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by president, Meagan Malchow.

Members Present: All council members were present.

Pastor read a devotion about Easter from a book by Frederick Buechner and started the meeting with a prayer.

Meeting Minutes: Brenda noted that Abbey's name was spelled wrong and has amended the minutes from the March meeting. The minutes were approved as amended with a motion from Carol and a second from Scott.

Treasurer's Report: Laurel presented the treasurer's

report for March 2018. The e-giving was at 27% of the total giving for March. Laurel spoke with the bank to request a refund on at least some of the over- draft charges from the debit card. She said the bank refunded

some, but not all. Laurel has also let the Garcias know that this issue continues to happen. They agreed to call Laurel to check the balance before they go shopping. We ended the month of March \$513.44 in the red. Quarter to date, we are \$471.96 in the black. Laurel included a detailed report of the total cost of running the food pantry in 2017. It was \$4,181.36. If we are able to obtain a 503(C) designation, we will be able to receive grants that will pay for the running of the food pantry. This will free up funds to be used in other areas in the church. Wade requested a budget line item report by quarter so that we can quickly see how our expenses and income are trending throughout the year. Laurel stated she could pretty easily put that together and will provide the report at the next meeting. The treasurer's report was approved with a motion from Brenda and a second from Carol.

Deacons Report: Dawn stated that Jim McKinney has shown her how to update our website. She was just having a problem with obtaining a password, which kept sending to Pastor's phone. They will coordinate with each other to get the password. Brad has not heard back from Hooligan's about a date for our fund raiser. Dawn will keep us posted. The 2018-2019 Membership Directory has been updated, and Pastor will run off copies to be available at church this Sunday.

Trustees Report: Wade suggested that the trustees create a maintenance checklist and keep a binder so

that things are not missed, especially in transition from out-going trustees to incoming folks who are new. For example, he was trying to check the furnace filters, but didn't see a way to get to them. None of the current trustees knew the last time batteries were changed in the thermostats. They will schedule a walk through for Sunday after church (April 22nd), hopefully with Rob, Randy and Matt. The idea is to make sure no maintenance issues are missed and to get information on where things are, what vendors we've used in the past, and how to do various things (i.e. Change furnace filters). Due to a phone call to Brad Sherseth from the fire department regarding a strong propane odor in the church, the furnace has now been thoroughly serviced with new filters. We lost a full tank of propane due to a malfunctioning thermostat. Wade replaced the light switch at the bottom of the stairs, as the previous switch

was guite loose. The gutters and Council downspouts were emergently replaced on two sides of the building. Meagan Minutes called G&L Enterprises to fix them as one gutter had fallen off, and resulted in flooding in the basement commons

area. Meagan has called Top Notch Cement twice about the flaking on the new cement of the parking lot. She has received no response, so will now reach out to Schaff Concrete. Shane stated that he can bring a Vactron from work to power wash the cement prior to resurfacing it. We will need to do this on a Sunday and block off the lot until the sealant is dry. Wade said that Sprague Roofing came to look at replacing our roof per the insurance agent's directive. Gary from Sprague said the roof is actually in great shape and does not need to be replaced. He saw no evidence of moss, and stated it is very rare in Montana, especially in our area. He stated that if it is indeed a problem, we can put copper sheeting under the first few rows of shingles and not have to re-do the whole roof. The copper will leach out any moss growing organisms before they can latch on. Meagan did obtain a bid for a metal roof, and it would be about \$8,897.00. Wade will schedule a meeting with Gary and our insurance agent on premises so it can be determined if we really need a new roof or not. Abbey researched fiberglass options for our entryway doors. She sent her findings to the meeting. There were several options to choose from, and the council all agreed that if we were to buy any, we would choose the option with the small windows at the top in a walnut stain. After the trustees do their walk through and prioritize projects, we will look at when/if we can replace the doors and how to fund them. It will cost about

\$2,000.00 for 2 fiberglass doors and hardware. Meagan had G&L Enterprises look at the replacement of the ceiling tiles in the sanctuary when they were on site to fix our rain gutters. They will give us some options and pricing. They suggested using wainscoting, sheet rocking the ceiling, or lining it with fir or light oak. Ray Gorham will look at it this Friday and give us bids as well. We need to have an idea of the cost so that we can begin some fund raising with the hope of having the necessary funds in 2019 to complete the project.

Old Business: The audit committee has been confirmed and they will meet in May or June. Kristianne Wilson will attend the first meeting to get the group pointed in the right direction. Laurel will participate as needed since she is our treasurer. The other members are John Herberg, Cindy Glinwood, and Meagan stated there is a third member, but did not have the name at the meeting. The E-Giving Program promotion is on track. Flyers were placed in the pews, and Jim has put the information on the church website. Dawn will update Facebook as well. The work of obtaining a 503(C) designation for the Food Pantry has been tabled until May or June - after tax season. We currently have about \$5,000 in our Memorial Fund. Pastor suggested using some money to buy a Paschal Candle to be used for Easter and Baptisms. Another suggestion was fixing or replacing our yard sign. After the Trustees do their walk through, we will prioritize projects that need additional funding.

Pastor's Report: Pastor performed two funerals in March. He visited the Senior Citizens and attended all of the Lent Soup/Supper devotions. He had several hospital visits and participated in the Seder Supper and the Good Friday services at Ballantine. Pastor said the attendance at the Good Friday service was the best it's been since he became our Pastor. The Easter Ad in the Billings Gazette was \$265 and the council members will absorb

this cost. Pastor's cell phone died. He has obtained a replacement, but the number remains the same. When Pastor is on vacation April 23-29, 2018, Dawn Petty will preside at the Sunday church service.

New Business: There was no new business discussed.

Mission Cornerstone: If Laurel is in town this

Sunday, she will speak about Family Promise. We need volunteers for this ministry service.
