CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING August 12, 2015

The Church Council met Wednesday evening after the BBQ, with five members present. Pastor Mark opened with devotions from "Reclaiming the 'L' Word". He also reported on his activities for the past month, which included officiating at St. John's for their worship on August 2nd; visiting patients at the hospitals; and cooking at the weekly community BBQ's. He has been attending the Wednesday luncheons for the Senior Citi-

zens and is getting acquainted with many of the people in this area. He baptized his granddaughter at Seeley Lake this past month, and also baptized four other people at that time. He is planning on the confirmation class for this fall, and said the Sunday School will be starting again. He has

been checking into projects for the "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday on September 13th, possibly doing some work at the Lions' Club Community Center, and putting in horseshoe pits or doing some painting on the building. Pastor will be out of town attending meetings from Sept. 6th to the 11th, plus going to the Bishop's Convocation with the Episcopal Diocese in Great Falls on September 24th.

Standing Reports included the Secretary's minutes, which were approved as printed. The Treasurer's report was discussed, recent offerings were low due to less attendance in the summer months. The report was accepted and held for audit.

The Deacons reported that Sunday School would be starting on September 13th. Also, we will begin raising monies for the Synod House in September and October with a mini-fundraising campaign called "From Our House to the Synod House", using various ways to accomplish this. The Synod campaign co-coordinator, Jeanne McCoskery, will be with us on Sunday, November 9th, to receive our offering and to let

us know how the Synod House project is progressing.

The Trustees report: The chair lift will need to be inspected regularly, and an inspection notice will need to be posted, according to the maintenance regulations.

Old Business: We will communicate with the congregation regarding plans for our facilities here, such as moving the existing parsonage, turning part of the garage into the Food Pantry, and extending our parking area over the old parsonage site. The Council is also planning a

retreat for Friday evening, September 18th and Saturday morning, September 19th. At the retreat, we will be reflecting on our current mission and vision and setting some long term goals. We will discuss the need for written policies/ procedures utilizing resources from the Synod and Pastor's

experience at former churches. He will also check on the church's policies and procedures regarding gay marriages, sexual abuse cases, and accusations of wrongdoings, and how do we handle them? What steps do we need to follow in making decisions and communicating them to the congregation?

New Business: We talked about supplies for "back to school" and the food pantry families, and what is needed. Kristianne will check with Dawn Sherseth to identify the appropriate contact to coordinate with at Shepherd Schools. The Pastoral Evaluation needs to be completed and turned in by September 3rd to Kristianne Wilson. Our next meeting will be September 16th, with an abbreviated agenda. The meeting was adjourned and we closed with the Lord's Prayer.

WOW!! We just finished preparing and enjoying eleven weekly barbecues for the community! What a fun time that was! Our menus consisted of


