Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

For many years now I have subscribed to the periodical called *The Christian Century: Thinking Critically, Living Faithfully.* One of the sections of the magazine is called "Century Marks" and it is made up of small news articles from various sources around the world. I was struck by two of the articles in the current issue. Now, I'm not being political or promoting one candidate over the other, I just ask you to hang in with me while I try to make my point. Here are the two articles:

LEARNING TO FEAR: Since the early 2000s, Americans have said in polls that crime has increased since the previous year, despite the fact that the national crime rate is about half of what it was in 1991, the peak year. There were, on average, 20,377 murders per year during the Reagan administration. In 2014 there were 14,249 murders. In the mean-time the population has increased 35 percent, driving the per capita rate of murder way down. The perception that crime is on the increase is likely fed by the media coverage, the entertainment industry, and by political rhetoric that play on peoples fears (*New York Magazine, July 19*).

TELLING THE TRUTH: PolitiFact is an independent fact-checking website. Since 2007 it has fact-checked major national politicians at least 50 times. By its measurement, the least truthful political politicians are (in this order): Donald Trump, Michelle Bachman, and Ted

From the Pastor Cruz. The most truthful are (in this order): President Obama, Hillary Clinton, and Jeb Bush. However, Clinton remains in many people's minds one of the most dishonest political figures. One explanation for this disparity is the prevalence of a

misogynistic notion that women aren't to be believed, even in the cases of rape (*Mormon Press, July 17*).

My question becomes, *what do we believe?* In an age when anybody can publish "their" truth on the internet to be read by people throughout the world, how do we know what is *truth*, what is *false* and what is merrily *opinion*?

Whether it is opinions about politics or what is the best laundry detergent, we need to be care about what we believe as "gospel truth" and what we also pass on as truth. Is there any "gospel truth" we can believe? Yes, there is the gospel truth of Jesus.

Jesus, through this life, death and resurrection shows us the truth of God's love and forgiveness for each of us. Jesus shows us how we can live new and different lives than the way of the world says we should. Jesus gives us the supreme law—love God and love your neighbor. Practicing that truth keeps us busy, honest and out of trouble. It's not easy, but as followers of Jesus, empowered by the Holy Spirit, that is what we are called to do. This we can believe!

Standing Reports

<u>Treasurer</u>

Sharon Wolske presented the July financial report which was approved by Jim and seconded by Laurel.

Sharon spoke to the \$15,000 loan that was approved

to pay off the remaining work that was done. The loan will start payments on 9/10/16 at \$371 a month, with an interest rate of 4.45%.

Our insurance agent has changed as our prior agent retired. We are gathering Information regarding updates to our facility

for a new policy with Guide One Insurance through Streeter Bros. This information includes the removal of the parsonage, updated work done on the parking lot and garage, and not needing flood insurance due to the ditch.

Food pantry donation from the outdoor worship tallies \$494.00

Laurel is struggling in getting volunteers for the Family Promise. This past month she had to reach out to Faith E for backup in supplying a meal and an overnight attendee as we did not have enough volunteers.

Carol has mailed out the church information to several members to help expedite updating the church directory.

Liz presented an updated "communion steward" guide to the council for approval. This guide is meant

to update our current practice, include a more accurate description of the job, and hopefully encourage more members to participate. She will bring a revised copy to the next meeting.

Liz brought up a concern from Dawn Petty regarding home bound members not getting a weekly bulletin. Dawn has volunteered to provide a list of members that are homebound to the council. Carol volunteered to take on this task. Liz will add this list to the Deacon duties as a reference for future council members.

<u>Trustees</u>

July 27th work day was successful in moving Bill Green's freezer he donated to the food pantry as well as cleaning up the area next to the garage. Megan Melchow's girl scout troop painted the ramp and swing set. The placement of peat rock and bumpers to come at a later date.

The sealant for the cement was not completed. Matt has been tasked with providing a list of what has been done and what has not been done for September newsletter.


