Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

John 1:1-8

There is no doubt about it! The days are getting shorter and the night is getting longer. On December 21st, the winter solstice, we will experience the day which has the greatest amount of darkness. I'm not exactly crazy about this fact. I like the light—I need the light. The darkness makes me feel uncomfortable, cold and even sometimes afraid.

I'm pretty sure this is not just due to the lack of sunshine, but rather is do to all the metaphorical darkness we experience in our lives. The world can seem like a dark place when we are constantly faced with war and the rumors of war; when people fight and speak evil of one another; when there are natural disasters such as earthquakes, tornadoes, flooding and severe snow storms; when our lives are touched by diseases and when death comes calling at our doors.

Yes, we live in this word surrounded by darkness. It is amazing then, that in the midst of the deepest darkness we celebrate Christmas. God comes into the darkness of our world through a poor, helpless baby. God comes into the darkness in the most vulnerable of ways and brings a light into the darkness. That light is the light of God's eternal love and forgiveness. This is what John is talking about when he wrote: *What has come into being* ⁴*in him (that is Jesus) was life, and the life was the light of all people.* ⁵*The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.*

Indeed, the world did it's best to overcome this light,



event to the point of nailing Jesus to a cross to experience the most cruel form of torture and death that human beings have ever created. And yet death could not hold Jesus, he rose from the grave—the darkness could not overcome him. Christmas is about celebrating the birth of God in the flesh who comes into the darkness of our world to give us light and life.

Every year at Christmas time I hear Christians saying we need to bring Christ back into Christmas. On the one hand I agree with this; Christmas has certainly become more secular than religious. On the other hand, however, I disagree with the statement "bring Christ back into Christmas" because Jesus has never left. I believe that the reality is that we, unlike John the Baptist, have forgotten or refused to bear witness to the light that is Jesus, God's own son. We have been seduced by the secular Christmas to get all wrapped up in partying and purchasing rather than witnessing to the one who gives us true light.

Christmas is a time to witness to and testify regarding the light that has come into our darkness. Christmas is a time to live the reality that love overcome hate; that forgiveness brings healing while revenge brings death. Christmas is the time to declare with the way we live our lives the truth that in Jesus the light has come into the world and the darkness cannot overcome it!

May God's light and love be with you and yours this Christmas.

SECRETARY: Minutes from October were approved as printed

TREASURER: Had a great month with giving in October. The new Simply Giving reports are easy to follow. Shows when and how much was given and is now officially on our website. Advent services will be held at 6:30pm this Advent Season on November 30 and December 14. No ecumenical Thanksgiving service this year as poorly attended in the past. Will have Christmas Eve service but there will be no Christmas Day service as the majority of the congregation said they would not be attending since Christmas is on a Sunday. December 18th is the Christmas Program with the kiddos and we will also have a baptism that day after the program.

OLD BUSINESS: Went over the notes from the Council Retreat and what our goals are for the remainder of 2016 and in to 2017. A motion was made to accept the council's goals and the motion carried. We have already started making great progress on these goals and will continue to update. EMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH — INFORMATIONAL MEETING NOTES FROM NOV 13, 2016

The church council held an informational meeting for the congregation following worship on November 13th to revisit our vote from several years ago to build a new/replacement parsonage. Questions have come up since that vote as to whether building a new parsonage is the best thing for our church. No decisions were made at this meeting as the purpose was to share some new information that has been compiled comparing what it will cost to have a parsonage versus paying a housing allowance. Here are a few of the questions that were asked at this meeting following the presentation by Wade Malchow and Sharon Wolske.

**What if we build a parsonage (say 3 bedroom/2 bath) but they have multiple children and the house isn't big enough?

We most likely won't have someone with a large family looking at such a small, rural church as we probably wouldn't be able to pay them enough to support a large family.

**If we have a parsonage but the pastor has their own house, would we be paying both the mortgage and a housing allowance? We would have to make living at the parsonage part of our requirements of a new pastor.

**If we build the parsonage and have a shared pastor that is not living there or have an interim pastor, what happens to the house? We would still have to make the mortgage payments on it so we would probably end up renting it out which then makes us landlords. Also, the rental income would then have to be reported

on our income taxes.

**Would we still have to pay a housing allowance if we had a parsonage?

No, it would be the expectation that the pastor/family would live in the parsonage. We could chose to add a housing equity allowance to the pastor's salary and benefit package for their long term asset development.

**What would happen if we choose not to build a parsonage? Even though we don't currently have a housing allowance in our budget it is a Synod expectation and if we chose not to have a parsonage, this new expense will require additional congregational giving.

Following discussion and a question and answer session there was a sense that those present desired to revisit the former decision to build a parsonage. This will be an agenda item at the January 29th, 2017 Annual Meeting.



The Church Council will be adopting a resolution at their December meeting to create a 3-5 member Constitution Review Committee. There is an opportunity for 1-2 congregational members to serve on this committee that will be meet periodically over the next year to update Emmanuel's constitution. Resources and

support are available through the Montana Synod to bring our current constitution, last updated in 2002, into compliance with the required provisions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA). The committee will also be reviewing provisions that we can tailor to meet the needs of our church operation.

- Nonstick cooking spray
