# HISTORY OF THE HARVEST DINNER EVENTS

The Harvest Dinner and Bazaar was started here at Emmanuel many years ago, when the women's group was still called the "Ladies Aid". It seemed there often was a shortage of funds for various needs around the church, and the ladies decided to put on a dinner and bazaar. The Bazaar items were always hand made, crocheted or knit, and a quilt was sewn for a raffle. A variety

of baked items were made by the ladies, also. For the past 35 years or more, the dinner menu has included the traditional roast beef, gravy, mashed potatoes, green beans, squash, coleslaw, freshly baked dinner rolls and pies.

The ladies (now called the ELCW, or Emmanuel Lutheran Church Women, continue to prepare this event each fall as the biggest fundraiser of the year. The monies raised have provided appliances for the church and parsonage, painting, carpet, special needs, and are often used to help pay the annual benevolences for the church. The menu is a popular meal, and anticipated by people from the Billings' churches and neighboring communities. Bazaar items are still donated by our members, and for the last five or six years, we have also had an auction of various unique items, which is very entertaining. This year's auctioneer duties will be shared by Pastor Mark and Randy Vanberg and will start about 12:30 noon up in the church.

Plan to take part in this annual event, which will be held on Sunday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, from 11:30 AM to 2:00 PM. You will be glad you did!



Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

"Do you believe in miracles?" Those were words made almost immortal when Al Michaels reacted to the final second of the hockey game between the United States and Russia as the up-start US team beat the Russian veterans and won the 1980 Olympic Gold in hockey.



Together in Hope," the first joint Catholic-Lutheran Commemoration of the Reformation at the global level followed 50 years of international dialogue between the Catholic Church and the LWF.

"Help us to rejoice in the gifts that have come to the Church through the Reformation, prepare us to repent for the dividing walls that we, and our

forebears, have built, and equip us for common witness and service in the world," Pope Francis said in a prayer at the beginning of the service.

Spontaneous applause broke out as Pope Francis and Bishop Younan later signed a Joint Statement committing Catholics and Lutherans to deepen their communion and common witness for justice.

About 500 worshippers filled the Cathedral for the service, where they heard sermons in Spanish by Pope Francis and Rev. Junge.

There are two paragraphs from the Joint Statement that I would also like to share.

As we move beyond those episodes in history that burden us, we pledge to witness together to God's merciful grace, made visible in the crucified and risen Christ. Aware that the way we relate to one another shapes our witness to the Gospel, we commit ourselves to further growth in communion rooted in Baptism, as we seek to remove the remaining obstacles that hinder us from attaining full unity. Christ desires that we be one, so that the world may believe (cf. John 17:23).

Many members of our communities yearn to receive the Eucharist at one table, as the concrete expression of full unity. We experience the pain of those who share their whole lives, but cannot share God's redeeming presence at the Eucharistic table. We acknowledge our joint pastoral responsibility to respond to the spiritual thirst and hunger of our people to be one in Christ. We long for this wound in the Body of Christ to be healed. This is the goal of our ecumenical endeavours, which we wish to advance, also by renewing our commitment to theological dialogue.

While we live in politically contentious times in a dangerous world that continues to pit human beings against one another, I believe in miracles! I long for the day when Lutherans and Roman Catholics and indeed all Christians will sit together at the Lord's Table and witness to the oneness that we share in the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus. Then we may truly begin to bring healing to our broken world.

Do you believe in miracles? That phrase has been used over the past several days in reference to this year's World Series Championship between the Chicago Cubs and the Cleveland Indians. Many Cubs fans woke up this morning firmly believing in miracles as the Cubs have won their first World Series in 108 years. I, for one, am thrilled!

This past week, however may have experienced an even greater miracle as an important event happened that may one day culminate in the healing between Lutherans and Roman Catholics that has been 500 years in the making. Leaders from both the Lutheran Churches and Roman Catholics Churches met on October 31, 2017 for a historic worship service and the signing of a Joint Statement on the occasion of the Joint Catholic-Lutheran Commemoration of the Reformation.

I would like to share with you some of the news report posted on the Lutheran World Federation sight relating to this historic meeting.

#### A commitment to move together in hope

(LWI) – Almost 500 years after the Reformation, which pitted Lutherans and Catholics against each other for centuries, leaders of the two traditions gathered in Lund, Sweden, to repent for past divisions and to commit themselves to common witness and service in the world.

Pope Francis and Kurt Cardinal Koch of the Catholic Church, and the President and General Secretary of The Lutheran World Federation (LWF), Bishop Dr Munib A. Younan and the Rev. Dr Martin Junge, embraced during a service of Common Prayer in the city's historic Cathedral, as they offered each other a sign of peace.

"With joy we have come to recognize that what unites us is far greater than what divides us," said the LWF President Younan, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, in words of welcome to the service on 31 October, the anniversary of the 1517 Reformation.

Minutes from the September meeting were approved as published in the October church newsletter.

Treasurer's report- Sharon reviewed the year to date financial report with focus on September income and disbursements. Regular giving, special offerings and parking lot loan repayment are occurring as budgeted. Sharon requested updating signatories on our checking accounts—Motion made and seconded to remove Terri Hensley and David Nelson's names from the regular and youth checking accounts. Motion passed. We continue to have 2 signatories on all checking accounts.

Deacon's report- Laurel stated we continue to have difficulty fulfilling our commitments to Family Promise, 2 evening meals and 2 stay overs. There are other needs of the organization that may fit our volunteer capacity. We will discuss again in the new year.


Trustee's report- Wade reported that a company will be coming to the church to help with new locks, do not duplicate keys, as per our discussion and decision last month with the facility coordinator ( Abbey/ Robb Emmons). General discussion occurred about the lack of progress on the food pantry relocation/ garage remodel.

Pastor's report- Usual activities, in addition to counseling for Lindsay Carol and Buckley Reynolds for their recent wedding. There are 15 children in the 3 session First Communion class. Pastor will be attending the Bishop's Convocation in Helena on 10/16. We agreed to have 2 Advent services using the Holden Evening Prayer on 11/30 and 12/14.

Old Business- Wade and Sharon reviewed the handouts drafted for use in the 11/13 congregational meeting ,the purpose is to have a detailed discussion of the cost of a new parsonage versus building a new

expense - housing allowance- into our annual budgets. We hope to facilitate discussion around the pros and cons of each option. The meeting will be discussion only and a decision, either to confirm or not, the existing congregation decision of January 2014 to replace the parsonage. Background information for this 11/13 meeting will be included in the November church newsletter. Jim shared that the Simply Giving tool is now functional. We've successfully tested a couple of credit cards and checking accounts for electronic giving. Jim encouraged additional Council members to try the tool. Plans are to roll out this option for all members use in November. Jim will do a mission cornerstone update on this program at a November church service as w ell.

New Business- Kristianne reported the need to amend our church constitution to incorporate changes adopted by the Churchwide Assembly. This will be an item of business for action on our January 2017 annual meeting. Emmanuel has not updated through amendments our constitution since 2001.

# What Happened in the Reformation?

Martin Luther posted his "in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517 and the resulting debate about Christian teaching and practice led to changes that have shaped the course of Western Christianity for almost 500 years. At the heart of these wide-reaching changes was a deep conviction that God's mercy or grace in Jesus is given freely to all. When Luther and others learned to trust God's mercy with "a living, daring confidence," they discovered in that faith the freedom to give themselves generously, lovingly in all of life's undertakings with everyone they met.

The changes began with a critical look at confession and forgiveness, preaching and the sacraments — what Luther called the "means of grace." The sale of indulgences, the practice of penance, the content of preaching, the administration of Baptism and the Lord's Supper — all the restrictions that impeded the message of God's mercy from being heard and received fully by all came under close scrutiny. Repeatedly, Luther made changes and took initiatives to give full and free expression to the gospel, the message of God's liberating mercy in Jesus Christ. He translated the Scriptures into German so that ordinary believers could hear the Word of God in their everyday language. He composed many hymns including "A Mighty Fortress" (based on Psalm 46) that put the Word of God to music, the language of the heart. He preached for the people in Wittenberg in simple, everyday terms, and he used those sermons as the basis for teaching resources that parents and local pastors could use — his Small and Large Catechisms.




# What you need:

- Marker or pen


#### What you do:

- 1. Measure and cut enough ribbon to wrap around the jar's neck, below the lid. Glue in place and let dry.
- 2. Fold each piece of paper in half three times, resulting in eight rectangles per sheet. Cut along the fold lines, and you'll have 24 rectangles.
- 3. Each day in November until Thanksgiving, write down one blessing from God. Then place that blessing in the jar.
- 4. On Thanksgiving, open the jar and read all your blessings to your family and friends.
