Dear Friends at Emmanuel,

[Jesus said:] ²⁵"There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves.

²⁶People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. ²⁷Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. ²⁸Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

Luke 21:25-28

We are preparing to enter the Season of Advent this coming Sunday. Advent is the shortest Season on the Church Year and one that we don't always like. It is about preparation and waiting, it is about patience—things that seem to be difficult for us in our society today. We don't like waiting (Christmas items began appearing in stores the day after Halloween) and we are not a patient people.

Advent is also a season of hope. Hope can be a difficult thing when we live in a world that doesn't seem to have much hope. The Gospel lesson for the First Sunday in Advent this year from the Gospel of Luke is from the 21st Chapter of Luke—his little apocalypse. Luke talks about the signs of the end—signs in the moon and the sun

and the stars and all kinds of earthly distress in nature. Jesus says people will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world.

Does that sound a bit like the world we are living in today? I sure think it does. The hurricane and tornado seasons are expanding and becoming more violent and destructive. We have just experienced the terrible fires in California and now, with rain on the way, there is fear about mud slides and flooding. I haven't seen pictures of people fainting in the streets, but there is certainly a

feeling of fear and foreboding in the air.

When Jesus was talking with his disciples he said "Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." That is precisely what we are preparing for and waiting for during the Season of Advent. When Christmas Day comes we will celebrate the redemption that has come in the birth of Jesus. We await the coming of the fulfillment of that redemption when Jesus comes again.

And so we prepare and we wait! We will celebrate with joy and with hope because our redemption has come in Jesus!

On the 25th we celebrate Christmas. I hope everyone gets what they want for Christmas this year. In my family we just do a gift name



Church Council Meeting Minutes - 11/14/2018 Submitted by Secretary: Brenda Emerick

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by president, Meagan Malchow.

Members Present: Meagan, Brenda, Carol, Laurel, Liz

and Pastor Mark

Members Absent: Shane, Wade, Scott, Dawn

Guests Present: Laura Vanberg

Laura Vanberg presented some fund raising ideas to begin raising money to replace the sanctuary ceiling. The council approved all of the suggestions. They will be brought to the annual meeting in January to vote on, if the congregation votes in the Ceiling Repair project.

Pastor led devotions which were centered on how members can show their faith in action through stewardship and service. Pastor went over a couple of graphs and pie charts showing the Montana Synod Designated Giving for 2017, and how much money was spent on various relief ministries, missions, programs to help

families in need, campus ministries, as well as Synod staff salaries, and administration.

Meeting Minutes: The October meeting minutes were a approved as written with a motion from Carol and a second from Liz.

Treasurer's Report: Laurel provided the October Profit & amp; Loss Statement, along with a YTD P&L statement. For the month of October, we are in the black with net income of \$174.55. Our YTD net income is at \$16.621.00. but this total includes the Memorial Funds and the Food Bank donations. We have \$1,000.00 left to pay on the parking lot loan, which should be paid off by the end of the year. Laura reported that the electrical bills for the church and the garage both doubled this past month. The Food Bank will reimburse the church general fund in December for the Food Bank electrical bills. That should total around \$400.00. The audit is scheduled to take place this Saturday, November 17, 2018. The treasurer's report was approved with a motion from Brenda and a second from Carol.

Deacons Report: Liz will check with Town Pump to verify how we report our total fund-raising dollars at the end of November in order to receive their matching funds. We have already raised over \$3,000, so we will qualify for the \$2,500 in matching funds from Town Pump for the Food Bank. The Harvest dinner brought in close to \$5,000.00 for the lady's group.

Trustees Report: No trustees were in attendance. Meagan reported that she and Wade donated the new ballasts for the altar, and Wade changed them out last weekend. Daryl Mack removed the leaves and tree branches from the yard at a cost of \$150.00. The work day in October was cold and snowy, but the new metal ramp was installed and most of the garden was cleaned out.

Old Business: Meagan stated that the Food Pantry rain gutters were donated by the Green family and have been installed. The Food Pantry received a donation from the Boot Scootin' Britches 4-H Group of 200 pounds of food. The total cost of replacing the Sanctuary ceiling will be between \$16,000 - \$20,000 and includes new fans and lighting. The current ceiling will be covered up, as opposed to tearing it out and then replacing it. This will save on labor, and eliminate concerns about possible asbestos that may be in the ceiling. Liz moved to switch our fund-raising

efforts from the Town Pump Food Pantry Matching Funds fundraiser, to the Ceiling Fundraiser. Laurel seconded the Minutes motion and it passed. The fund raising ideas agreed to by the council include the option to buy a ceiling tile at \$25.00

per tile, and/or to fill jars with loose change. Malchows are donating a gumball machine which will be filled with gumballs as we meet our fund-raising milestones. This will offer a visual of our progress, as well as the names on the ceiling tiles. The ceiling project and fund raiser will all be presented at the annual meeting for the approval of the congregation. Members of the Endowment Fund board will present the new Endowment Fund Constitution at the annual meeting. Laurel reported that the Family Promise night for our church occurs once per quarter on a Tuesday night. Our commitment has been reduced to just one night instead of two. Laurel said that the kids and babysitters are there at 5:30 pm while the adults are in class. The adults then come in at 7:30 pm. Meagan reminded everyone that the Eagle Scout project that the council approved last month will be taking place on Saturday, November 17th. Lunch will be served. Anyone volunteering should bring work gloves, shovels and rakes.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Mark attended his regular pastor meetings, text studies, and Sr. Citizens meetings. Confirmation is going well with four 6th graders and four 7th graders attending. Pastor attended our work day on Saturday, October 13th and the spagnetti dinner on the 14th after church, as well as the Endowment Fund Board meeting. He also attended the Bishop's convocation in Helena on Friday, October 26, 2018. He ordered new candles for the Christmas Eve service which will be held at 8:00 pm on Christmas Eve.




