

The Montana Synod has a New Bishop

At the Montana Synod Assembly the voting members elected the Rev. Dr. Laurie Jungling as the new Bishop of the Montana Synod on the fifth ballot.

Pr. Jungling is a native of Montana. She graduated from Montana State University, and Luther Seminary. After serving a call in rural South Dakota, she enrolled in a PhD. program at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, where she also served as campus pastor at PLTS.

While completing her dissertation, she served as Interim Director of NRIT. She then taught ethics and religion at Augustana Religion in Sioux Falls, South Dakota for six years, until financial cutbacks eliminated her position.

Since then she has served in interim ministry in the Montana Synod in the following congregations: Redeemer Lutheran in Great Falls; St. Paul's Lutheran in Cutbank; Hope Lutheran in Powell, Wyoming; Gold Hill Lutheran in Butte.

In the Synod Newsletter on June 12th our Bishop Elect wrote the following:

Dear Friends in Christ,

"I dream of a Church bubbling with people who are excited about their trust and commitment in the new life already given to us in Jesus Christ. I dream of a Church that lives a responsibly risky faith, trusting in the promised gift of God's



amazing grace, following Christ's journey into the changing future. I dream of a Church that says to Jesus again and again, "Yes, we can!" rather than, "No, we won't."

These are just a few of the words I shared with the Montana Synod Assembly during my speech on Saturday, June 1st during the election of the new bishop. Later that day, the Holy Spirit through the amazing work of the assembly changed my life in ways I never expected. I am honored and humbled by the vote of confidence your delegates showed in me as they elected me to be the synod's bishop.

In one congratulatory note, someone told me that as bishop, I would never be bored. While that is a little scary, I am comforted by the knowledge that I won't be alone in this role. Some of you have wondered about upcoming changes to the synod staff. I am so grateful that most of the staff have agreed to stay in their current positions for at least a year after I start my call as your bishop. This will make the transition much smoother for me and for you. Susan Hedahl, who is ready to retire, has agreed to stay through September and is willing to help train her successor as needed. Her presence and work in the office will be deeply missed. I also want to thank Bishop Crist who, over the last twelve years, has exemplified for me what a really good bishop is and does,

and who is offering her much needed guidance through this transition process.

As we move forward together, I ask for your prayers. I ask for your participation in the life of the synod. I ask for your support in whatever ways you are able to provide it. I cannot be bishop alone and none of us can be followers of Christ alone. We need each other for we really are "Church Together." Thank you for this opportunity to serve Christ with you as a sheep and a shepherd, as coach and teammate, as pastor, leader and prophet. May God bless us with the new life of Christ as we journey forward into the Spirit's future.

COMMENTARIES OF THE CHURCH MOUSE


Greetings Friends and Neighbors,

Church Council Meeting Minutes – 6/6/2019 Submitted by Secretary: Brenda Emerick

The meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by president, Meagan Malchow.

Members Present: Meagan, Brenda, Ricker, Dawn, Jill, Patty, Liz, Laurel, Linda, Scott and Pastor Mark

Pastor presented the devotion, and we began with a prayer.

Meeting Minutes: The May meeting minutes were approved as amended with the correct spelling of Maryann's name. Motion from Jill passed with a second from Dawn.

Treasurer's Report: The May Profit & Loss Statement as well as the YTD P&L were handed out. For the month of May, we were in the red with net income of -\$2,097.36. The total net income for January through May is in the red at -\$8,926.48. We had to borrow more money in May from the Memorial Fund to

cover expenses. There is only \$2,847.80 left in the Memorial Fund, so one more month like these last two will leave us unable to pay our bills. The council looked at expenses to determine if there is anything we can cut out. There really are no expenses that we can remove, so we need to look at bringing in new members. Pastor encouraged the council to invite friends and neighbors to church in hopes they will become members. We did pick up a few new members from our barbecues which will start again on June 19th. The E-Giving has gone way down, and we have lost members who were large donors. Since the Food Pantry is solvent, Meagan stated she would consult the board to determine if they could sustain a rent payment to the church. She believes they could pay around \$250 per month. The council agreed that at this point, every little bit helps. Liz will write another letter to members stating the programs we have in place and the need for members to contribute what they can in order to keep our little country church going. The treasurer's report was approved with a motion from Brenda and a second from Scott.

Old Business: Jill will obtain at least 2 -3 more bids for comparison for the Raise the Roof project. So far, \$6,549.40 has been raised.

The cement curbs around the church were installed by Aspen Curbing at no charge to the church. The owner, Hal Pavelis stated that one of his employees used our food pantry over the winter when he was laid off, so Hal was happy to give back to our church. Laurel sent him a thank you note.

The Boy Scouts painted the swing set and rototilled the garden. Between the Scouts and several church volunteers, about 2/3 of the garden has been planted. There are a few plants sitting out that still need to be planted. A watering sign-up sheet will be available starting this Sunday. The well puts out a lot of water, so it does not need to be turned up full blast. Doing so will blow out the drip system. Liz will include some



instructions with the watering sign-up sheet. Ricker donated a lot of time and materials to set the posts and dig holes for 24 grape vines. All have been planted and Ricker will water them.

With our dismal finances, the council agreed to postpone painting around the stained-glass window and re-sealing the parking lot until this fall. We hope to have

a garage sale in July or early August with the proceeds to go towards these two projects. Brenda will research pricing for the wheelchair toilet and sink, as well as drywall, flooring, a door, trim and electrical work to change the Men's bathroom into a wheelchair accessible bathroom. Both bathrooms will then be either sex bathrooms. After we have a firm budget for this project, we will look at ways to raise the money to accomplish it.

Our VBS is going forward on Friday evening and Saturday morning – June 28th from 5:00pm – 8:00pm and June 29th from 9:00am – 12:00noon. An e-mail flyer went out to the congregation already. Dawn and Liz plan to put flyers out at the daycares and have Pastor give them to our area churches that he meets with. Dawn and Liz will let us know what they need for donations for treats and craft projects.

Pastor Mark will work with Colter at the MT Synod office to update our website and get it set up so that any of us can update it. Currently, only Jim McKenney has access, so we don't get it updated as frequently as we would like. We all agreed that any of us are able to post to our Facebook page, and that we should all do that as much as possible. Meagan

will post pictures of the Scouts planting the garden. Ricker will add photos of the crew planting the grape vineyard. Liz will add information about VBS.

Meagan showed a photo of the new community garden sign that Hayes Nydeggar made for us. It's a metal sign that will require 2 posts for support. Ricker suggested an all-weather backing to allow the words to stand out more. Meagan will look into options.

Patty reported that the Blood Mobile is available on Wednesday, August 7th from 2:00pm – 6:00pm. They need a guarantee of at least 24 donors. Patty will have a sign-up at church starting this Sunday.

New Business: We need to find a way to get our lawn mowed. Brenda will ask the new cemetery caretaker if he will do it for \$25 per mow. If so, Laurel volunteered to pay for the first month and Liz will pay for the second month. If he is unable to do this we will need to create a sign-up sheet for volunteers to help. We do have a push mower in the garage that could be used. Brad Sherseth, Robert McSweyn and Wade Malchow have all taken a turn mowing this spring. Thanks so much to these volunteers!

Pastor reported that there was a snafu with multiple church members asking for tables and chairs for graduation. There were no tables left in the garage, so one family took all the tables from the basement. We do not want these tables going out. The council agreed that for future reference, only Pastor and the Eammons can approve the use of church tables and chairs. If a council member is asked, they need to refer the church member to these folks.

Giving Back to the Community: The Lions Club have asked for help installing an underground sprinkling system at the Community Center. They are meeting next Monday to finalize their plans and will let us know when they want to do the work. This will serve as our "God's Work, Our Hands" project.

Meagan and Brenda provided some information on pricing for our Movie in the Park idea that was proposed at our retreat. We couldn't find a good Friday night for the movie, and with the expense



involved, we agreed to table this idea for now.

Pastor's Report: Pastor reported that he attended his usual text studies and Senior Citizens meetings. He performed two home visits, one wedding, one baptism and one funeral. He also participated in the Baccalaureate at Shepherd on May 16th and attended the Synod Assembly May 31 – June 2nd. He will be on vacation at the end of June and will ask Dawn to cover for him at the church service on June 30th.
