Emmanuel Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes December 11, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 7:10pm by president, Meagan Malchow.

Members Present: Meagan, Liz, Linda, Laurel, Ricker, Brenda, Patty, Dawn, Scott and Jill

Council members brought holiday food to share and Liz presented a devotion to begin the meeting.

The minutes from the November meeting were approved as written.

Laurel had previously e-mailed the November Profit & Loss Statement, as well as the YTD P&L. The memorial account has been paid back in FULL and we ended the month of November

with a checkbook balance of \$4,173.38. The fully funded Memorial account balance is now \$12,788.68. We received a matching funds check from an anonymous donor for \$1,650.00, which was specified to go to the general fund. We also raised more than

enough for the matching funds grant to the food pantry for \$2,500.00. We have discussed funding an account to have for an emergency fund. Laurel suggested that starting in January, we open an account for that purpose and decide on an amount or percentage that we can set aside monthly. When we are not paying a pastor, we are saving approximately \$6,800.00 monthly. Jill reported that the finance audit committee has been scheduled to meet on January 11, 2020 with the following members: Laurel, Jill, Sharon Wolske, Abbey Emmons, Robin McCaffrey and Cindy Glinwood. Jill and Laurel will work on the 2020 budget to be presented at the Annual Congregational Meeting on January 26th. The council will determine budgetary proposals for the congregation to vote on. Included may be the option of using \$10,000 of the insurance money for the Food Pantry building to add to the almost \$10,000 already raised for the Raise the Roof campaign to move ahead with completing that project. It would make sense to get that done and then have the new carpet from the hail damage installed in the sanctuary.

Old Business: The Call Committee has created a survey form and sent it out via e-mail to the congregation. It has also been in the bulletins the last few Sundays. They are asking the congregation for input on what they want to see with a new Pastor. This will help the committee in their search.

Meagan apologized as she ended up signing all contracts with Big Sky Exterior Designs, instead of just the window contract. The council had previously voted to only sign the window contract to see how the service and quality of their work is before moving forward. Somehow, all of the contracts were presented to Meagan, and she ended up signing them all – siding and roof as well as windows. She apologized and offered to resign. The council unanimously agreed that we all make mistakes, Meagan is very busy, and Todd has to take some responsibility for putting the contracts in front of her when he knew we were going to wait to sign them. Todd tried to have them returned, but his management would not allow that. There is a 20% penalty for breaking the contract. We agreed to move ahead, and if at any point, we are unhappy with the work, we can break the contract(s) at that time. Scott will act as our Construction Superintendent to communicate with the contractors and make sure everything goes well. (Todd did work hard to obtain an additional \$30,000 from the insurance company to allow us to have the best outcome with the repairs.) Meagan suggested that in the future, if there are any contracts to be signed, the council should require two signatures. That way there is a back-up set of eyes to help insure this type of situation does not reoccur. The windows have now been delayed until mid-January due to the specialty glass that has been ordered.

After the discussion at the November meeting around keys and church security, Meagan

requested that Abbey check a key out to each council member. They have not yet been dispersed, but should be soon.

New Business: Meagan reported that the Food Pantry has invested in a keyless remote locking system. People are able to obtain entry via their fingerprints. There is also a motion sensor a ctivated video surveillance system that sends video to the cloud that is accessible for 30 days. If their new system works well, the council may consider installing it at the church as well. Initial investment is about \$900.

The water pump went out a few weeks ago. Wade met American Drilling at the church and they repaired the pump for \$385.00.

Meagan asked for input on the Lay Pastors we have had. The council agreed that they have all been very good and our attendance has stayed steady.

The Sunday School Christmas program will be December 22nd.

Brenda suggested that we create a maintenance log so that we can all see at a glance when projects are due, such as replacing furnace filters, etc. Lis volunteered her husband Phil to do a safety audit. We aren't sure when the fire extinguishers were last checked, etc. Phil is a retired fireman so is an ideal candidate to inspect the church from a safety perspective. Brenda will make the logs for approval at the next meeting.

Save the date: Christikon Benefit Auction at the Billings Depot is scheduled for April 26th.




