




EMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH WOMEN

Catch Me If You Can

Frank William Abagnale Jr. (born April 27, 1948) is an American security consultant known for his career as a con man, check forger and imposter when he was 15 to 21 years old.

He became one of the most notorious impostors claiming to have assumed no fewer than eight identities, including an airline pilot, a physician, a US Bureau of Prisons agent, and a lawyer. Abagnale escaped from police custody twice (once from a taxiing airliner and once from a federal penitentiary) before turning 22 years old. He served fewer than five years in prison before starting to work for the federal government. Abagnale is currently a consultant and lecturer for the FBI academy and field offices. He also runs Abagnale and Associates, a financial fraud consultancy company.

Abagnale's story inspired the Academy Award nominated feature film, *Catch Me If You Can* (2002), starring Leonardo DiCaprio as Abagnale and Tom Hanks as the FBI agent pursuing him.

There are many scams out there waiting for you. There are telephone scams, banking scams, census related scams, government grant scams, investment scams, lottery and sweepstake scams, charity scams, pyramid scams, ponzi schemes, ticket scams—the list is endless. Frank Abagnale shares his insight and knowledge on a video you can find on youtube. Search for "Catch Me If You Can / Frank Abagnale / Talks at Google" (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=vsMydMDi3rI).

This is a video that will tell us much about running a scam, about credit cards, about cyber crime, about being a father, about the value of a good wife. It will help us all start to understand more of the reality of deception. Some good questions at the end.




Local Youth Serving in the military:
