Secretary's report

Everyone has read the minutes to the August meeting. Dawn made a motion to approve the amended minutes and Laurel seconded. The motion passed.

Treasurer's report

The treasurer's report was reviewed. A number of motions were included with the motion by Dawn to approve the treasurer's report with a second from

Linda, motion passed. Additional motion items iincluded opening a money market savings account which was previously voted on by the council of a three month savings, this will total a minimum of \$24,000. The motion also included adding Robin McCafferee and removing Carol Kramer from all of our accounts including: general checking, youth fund, building fund, memorial, Shepherd Area Food Pantry, and the new money market account.



Pastor Asselstine has been in contact with another congregation in Billings for configuration. He has a pastor in mind but will not be available until the end of the summer. Bishop Laurie is also conferring with her counterparts in the Congregational and Methodist churches. So if an opportunity is available between Shepherd, Huntley, Worden, or Ballantine that is also a part of the mix of "sharing" to consider.
