Emmanuel Lutheran Church Accepts Role as ELCA Internship Site

Emmanuel Lutheran has been without a pastor for over 18 months. The efforts of the Call Committee were hampered in 2020 by the COVID-19 pandemic and the challenge of creating an arrangement with another congregation to share a full-time pastor given Emmanuel's financial position.

Fortunately we have been able to sustain our mission of being a welcoming church in a rural community called by God to joyful worship, caring relationships and loving service. We could not have accomplished this without the dedication of our members, a committed Church Council, a diverse group of lay pastoral associates who provided consistent Sunday worship services and the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Montana Synod offered in early spring 2021 Emmanuel the opportunity to serve the whole church, the ELCA, by becoming an internship site--assisting a future pastor to prepare for ministry leadership. The Church Council agreed to this cooperative educational venture and Keith Weatherford, a Billings man who is pursuing ministry as a second career, will begin his full-time internship with Emmanuel August 2021 through July 2022. The call process will be paused during this time frame; however, it is the Synod's intention to continue to work with our ecumenical partners to identify a 'shared' pastoral arrangement that can be put in place following this internship period.

Emmanuel has the responsibility, as the ministry site, to assist the seminarian/intern to become better prepared for effective ministry. The internship is a learning arrangement, and the intern is a student. This process is accomplished in part through an Internship Committee which will consult with the student, Keith Weatherford on a learning covenant; identifying resources and opportunities for learning that are available at Emmanuel. We have shared Emmanuel's ministry priorities developed at the beginning of the call process with Keith and Pastor Darren Paulson, Atonement Lutheran Church in Billings, who will serve as the off-site ministry supervisor. The Council has appointed Dawn Petty and Kristianne Wilson to serve on the Internship Committee. Jill Hoffman and Liz White will be members as well and co-chair the Committee. We are hoping to add a few more members. If you are interested, please see Jill or Liz.

The Internship Committee will be meeting monthly with the intern and Pastor Darren Paulson to offer support, feedback and fellowship. The committee will be actively involved in the evaluation and feedback process to the student/intern as we experience their ministry and prepare them for their final year of preparation for ordination .


there and enjoy the summer. There is so much to do and explore in our great state.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES May 12,2021

The meeting was opened by President Jill Hoffman, and opening devotions were read by Meagan.

Meagan Malchow and Scout Roman Glinwood presented the plan for the landscaping around the church that Roman will be doing to earn his Eagle Scout award. He had prices for a variety of rock for the surface of the beds, such as small limestone, small river rock, large limestone, and scoria. He also showed the different kinds of plants and shrubs he intended to put in., and the council suggest-

ed certain preferences for them, and the price for the rocks and the plants will be approximately \$1000.00. Meagan made a motion to take that fee from the general fund, and it was seconded by Robin, and the motion was passed. Meagan further explained that the garden area and its beautification would be handled by the girl scout troop. They also would install a bench and two planters in their project, and have planned a workday for the last weekend in May to accomplish this. Greg motioned, seconded by Sharon to accept this plan for the garden beautification. Lunch would be served to those 20 to 25 workers, on the day of May 29th, as they planned to work from 9:00 AM to noon.

The Minutes from the April meeting were presented, and a motion was made by Sharon, seconded by Greg to accept them. Sharon made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report, seconded by Linda, and the motion was passed. Linda reported problems with the computer in the office, and it has not been working well. Ricker will contact someone to check it out. Greg and Ricker will try to get the Fire Dept. to help with installing the louvres in the bell tower of the church. The Call Committee report about accepting an intern to serve our church was discussed. There is a shortage of pastors, so this would be a good option...and the intern who has been interviewed is Keith Weatherford. His salary will be discussed at our next council meeting. Guidelines for the Worship services will remain the same for at least another month

Lawn care is being provided by the cemetery board caretaker, at a cost of \$25.00 each time it is mowed. Council appointments were discussed, and the Youth Committee will be handled by Liz. Greg and Jill. Dawn Sherseth will help Liz with the Music arrangements for services. Laura Vanberg is working on updating



the church directory. Lunch for the workers in the garden on May 29th will be fed at noon, by Patty McVay and Dawn Petty. It was decided to wait until our June meeting to discuss summer BBQ's....also a possible garage sale for the latter part of the summer. Our cleaning lady will not be available for June 5th, and Dawn Petty will see that the church is

cleaned for that weekend.

In addition to his Eagle project, Glinwood completed a list of requirements including earning 21 merit badges while demonstrating leadership qualities during his tenure with the Boy Scouts. Roman has been a member of the Shepherd Emmanuel Lutheran church and enjoys working part time at the Feedlot, working on cars, and spending time with his fellow Troop 9 Scouts.
