We will be using the work group lists from several years ago, asking each of you to bring something. I also want to ask you ladies to volunteer for numerous positions where help is needed to make this event run smoothly. The jobs we need help with in the kitchen are: four persons to dish up food for individuals at the kitchen window; someone to make the relish trays, and refill them as needed, someone to mix and dish up the coleslaw; someone to prepare the mashed potatoes, or heat the green beans and squash, or make the gravy, or cut the beef roasts. Coffee and lemonade will need




2022 is just around the corner!

ELC Council Meeting 9/8/2021

The meeting opened with devotions by Vicar Keith Weatherford.

A special presentation was given by Pastor Tom Schlotterback, the President of St. John's Foundation, regarding the campaign for Resident care. He updated us on the facilities at St. John's, the financial needs for continued services, and the future plans for those services. His presentation was very interesting, and inspiring. It included the history of St. John's, beginning in 1960, from the small beginning to the 320-acre site, the loans, remodels, etc. to the present facility. The plan is to get 80% of the required funds for the expansion by March 21, 2022.

The Council meeting began with standing reports: The Secretary's report was approved as read. The Treasurer's report, presented by Sharon and Robin, was accepted, and approval given for purchasing a new computer, for \$1500.00, with the help of Kyle Newell. The Intern Committee report was given by Jill, and the monthly committee meeting will be held either September 15th or the 22nd to be announced.

Old Business: Liz gave an update on the Call Committee, Robin reported that Abbey said \$420.00 was collected for and donated to the Prison ministries, % Pastor Rob Nedbalek at Deer Lodge. Regarding any changes to our worship services it was decided not to pass around the sign-up sheets or the offering plates as yet, but to continue to leave them on the back table. The Youth Acolytes will be trained on September 26th, the ELCW will supply the necessary robes. The Lutheran Youth Collective will be held on Sept. 26th, with activity for grades 5 to 8, at Atonement Church. Confirmation classes will be restarted here, and Sunday School will begin on October 3rd, from 9:00 to 9:45 AM. The Prayer Line will be refreshed monthly, and there are cards in the pews for people who want to make prayer requests. Thank you gifts for the LPA's will be arranged. God's Work - Our Hands Day on September 12th, with various needed chores done on the premises, such as the community garden area, touch-ups to the church building, and to the lawns around the premises. The American Indian Alaska Native Lutheran Association asked for churches to display an orange banner, and Dawn will have the Quilting group create one, while

Linda will laminate the information sheet to display next to it.

New Business: There are some issues with the electrical lights on the stairway and on the outside, which will be checked over. The Church Council retreat has been tabled until spring. The Harvest Dinner and Bazaar will be held on November 7th, with posters distributed around the area churches. The Fall decorating for the church will be done after services on the 19th of September, with more help it will be done quickly.


YOUTH CHOIR If you are interested in joining youth choir, please contact Dawn Sherseth.


