CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING NOVEMBER 10, 2021

The Council met on Wednesday evening, at 7:00PM. Members present were Jill, Greg, Ricker, Keith, Sharon, Liz, Linda, Dawn, Robin, Patty and Meagan. The Secretary's report was accepted, motion made by Robin and seconded by Sharon. Dawn thanked the Council for the cyclamen plant which was given to her as a thank you for doing services when needed. Robin and Sharon did the Treasurer's report, and an update on the software for Quickbooks. A new computer was purchased, with the assistance of Kyle Newell, for the price of \$1500. A proposal was made to join Quickbooks and "flock" (Abbey's donation program) in January of 2022, which will cost \$480 to \$500 per year. A motion was made by

Sharon, seconded by Linda to accept the Treasurer's Report, and motion was carried.

Jill reported on the Intern Committee, and the goals and projects expected by the seminary. The mid-point evaluation is coming up soon. The monthly intern meeting will be held again at the home of Dawn Petty, on November 17th, at 7:00 PM Jill stated that everything is going

Old Business: Liz and Kristianne gave an update on the Call Committee. Kristianne had contacted the Synod office, and there are no pastors available at this time to fill vacancies. As to worship service guidelines, it was noted that moving the communion rail was helpful for now, and the way communion is being distributed. Our website and Facebook may be updated, too.

Youth Report: Dawn Sherseth is recruiting youth supporters, and will be doing a youth choir, consisting of twelve young people at this time. Practices will be held on Monday evenings at the church.

A time for the Christmas Eve service was discussed, and it was decided to try to have the service earlier in the evening. Therefore, at this coming Christmas Eve, the service will be held at 4:00 PM. A motion for this change of time was made by Greg, seconded by Sharon, and motion passed.

The campaign of St. John's Foundation for Resident Care requesting donations, was tabled for now, and will be brought up again at our annual meeting in January. It will be an agenda item, as to source of donations, whether it will be individual contributions or an ELC contribution. It was decided to have either Pastor Darrin Paulson or Tom Schlotterback come out to explain the needs at St. John's, and perhaps if they came to speak to us after a service in the sanctuary, and we could decide on the amount, possibly \$1500,

New Business: We will be needing some new officers in 2022 and the nominating committee was appointed, consisting of Linda, Patty, Ricker, Liz and Jill. Patty and Robin will begin working on the budget development for 2022. The annual meeting will be held on January 30th, immediately following our church service. We will need a volunteer to organize the agenda and reports, and set the due date for them, and should have that volunteer by our next council meeting. Reports should be in by January 9th, and then ready to go out by the 16th of January.
