Vicar's Voice



As we begin a new calendar year, we also begin a new liturgical year. We've entered year C of the RCL (Revised Common Lectionary) which means the focus will be on Luke's gospel. Luke's gospel is distinctive in the fact that about one-half of Luke's gospel is composed of material that is found nowhere else. Luke's gospel opens with a unique infancy narrative in the first two chapters and Jesus commences his ministry with an inaugural sermon found in chapter 4 that is recorded nowhere else. Luke also reports five miracle stories and a whopping seventeen parables not told in any of the other gospels. Luke also provides us with the only account of Jesus' ascension. If

we study and pay attention to the materials that are unique to Luke's gospel, we find there are several recurring topics: Women are prominent, Samaritans are mentioned repeatedly, Jerusalem is a frequent setting or focus in the stories, and there is considerable attention given to riches and poverty. Another of the unique stories found in Luke's gospel is that of Jesus' childhood visit to the Jerusalem temple following the Passover festival where he engages in dialogue with the temple elders. When his parents come back looking for Him, he remarks, "you should have known I would be in my Father's house." This text from the second chapter of Luke brings a focus to youth within our own midst and congregations, and how we approach faith formation. There has been much study and research to help us understand and examine how we should approach Faith formation with our youth. The common denominator that comes from the study and research is the importance and need of intergenerational interactions.

One such scholar and researcher in this field is Kenda Creasy Dean. Through the investigative research and data collection of the National Study of Youth and Religion (NSYR), Associate Professor Dean is able to point out and validate what many church leaders, youth ministers, congregational members, and parents have been asking about, struggling with, and trying to overcome. Dean brings quick attention to the fact that most youth leaders, pastors, and volunteers spend a good portion of their available time and energy finding, using, and trying to perfect "programs" when what is really needed is more pastoring. For this paradigm shift to take place, we must begin to move ourselves and our congregations away from being program directors, users, and followers and start seeing ourselves as missionaries or "one who is sent" to the wild, untamed mission fields of youth ministry. Since much of youth ministry is about building relationships, this paradigm shift must also move us into an incarnational ministry rather than relational ministry. This change places God in the flesh into the ministry and helps us to acknowledge that we are to prepare the way for the Lord as John the Baptist did, and point the way to Jesus Christ rather than become his replacement.

The really good news is that we already have the necessary tools to begin developing consequential faith. The first and by far the most important tools are parents. Martin Luther knew and recognized that faith formation began with youth ministry in the home, and that parents would be the best mentors to translate their own Christian faith to their children. Closely following the significance of parents are grandparents and congregational members. By sharing in and being able to tell their own faith experience stories, a common theological language for conversation is created. Adults and youth strengthen and mature in their faith. These transformative actions help aid us in moving towards a model where home is church, in a


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
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cross-generational faith community. With this comes the formation of authentic, available, and affirming AAA Christians in our homes, congregations, and communities. When Congregations provide opportunities and support for youth to become detached from their own world experience through disorienting cross-cultural mission experiences with others, provide them with the opportunity for reflexivity after feeling God's presence in thin places, and allow them time to live in liminal space to help strengthen their personal transformation, we enable them to teach, converse about, and participate in the God story of the Christian tradition. The Church can then begin to build consequential faith in teens and focus on who Christ is calling them to become on his behalf, not our own.

- Running the power point presentation during Sunday worship


Please contact Jill Hoffman or Vicar Keith if you are interested. We will also be discussing this issue at our annual meeting.
