"You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast because they trust in you. Trust in the Lord forever, for the Lord, the Lord himself, is the Rock eternal."

-Isaiah 26:3-4

The summer BBQ's are finished for this summer. We decided to end this event, because our turnout for these BBQ's was much smaller than in the past, and it was more of a problem to get people to sign up to help in the kitchen in preparation for the meals. Perhaps more families were traveling this summer, or involved in sporting events watching their c hildren perform, so they weren't able to attend the BBQ dinners. However, it was great to see people from the community who attended each time. Here are some of the totals for each meal: attending on June 15th, we had 26 people, on the 22nd there were 30 people, on the 29th, 19 people. Then in July, there were 20 attendees on the 5th, 23 on the 13th, and 35 on the 20th. (the totals I ncluded the 5 kitchen helpers/griller for each meal.) The total expenses for the meals came to \$626.72, and free will offerings totaled \$368.00, leaving a balance of \$258.72 paid by our Women's Group. Of course, there were various side dishes each time, donated by attendees, as well as 5 lbs. of hamburger patties donated. A special thank you to the people who brought delicious desserts, salads, baked beans, and pasta dishes. You made each meal so special!

We will plan on putting on the BBQ's again next summer. It was always rewarding to visit with people from our community that did attend, and we look forward to seeing you during the church year

also. Emmanuel Lutheran is a friendly church, helps to provide the space for various activities such as Pineview Quilters, 4H groups, school groups, and community meetings. Each fall, we have our Harvest Dinner and Bazaar, and that is a great event, on the 1st Sunday of November. Come and enjoy the fellowship and the delicious food.
