When I was growing up, the weekend after Thanksgiving was a special day in the Wyman household. With our bellies still full from the previous night's feast, we would head down to the basement, and haul the seemingly unending amount of Christmas decorations upstairs. Over the next three days, our house would transform from a normal Minnesota home, to a winter wonderland where every square inch was covered in something relating to Christmas. Boughs of garland hung from every bannister, light up reindeer strewn throughout the front yard, nativity sets in every room, and Christmas trees on every floor. The day after the house was all set up, presents would begin to appear beneath the trees. We weren't allowed to touch the presents, but we could look at them for as long as we wanted. I spent countless hours trying to figure out what could possibly fit into a box of a particular size, wondering what the present would be. The anticipation was overwhelming, and I only had to wait a month.

The Hebrew people who had awaited their coming Messiah had to wait a little longer than a month. It had been hundreds of years since they received the last prophetic word that we have written in the Hebrew Bible. It had been almost 1,000 years since the reign of King David, and the promise that was made to him. And who knows how long it had been since the promises were made to Abraham. These people had waited a long time for their Messiah to come. They may not have known exactly what it would look like, or how it would come, but they had faith that it would in fact come. And eventually, in a little town in Bethlehem, their waiting was finally over.

Our world has been in a season of waiting for a long time too. Waiting for hope, waiting for new life, waiting for togetherness, waiting for a time when all of the brokenness would be gone, and where nothing but the light and love of our God remains. And while our waiting may not quite be over, we are people of promise. We celebrate this Christmas season in the darkest, coldest, hardest part of the year because we are a people who believe that Christ shows up in the most difficult situations. Even if we may not know exactly what it will look like, we know that there is hope on the other side. When things seem hard, and you're not sure how you are going to make it work, look to Mary, the young virgin girl who felt overwhelmed by what she was called to do. We know that even when things seem dark, the light of Christ shines out of a manger. When things aren't going perfectly according to plan, we know that our promised Messiah was born among the animals. We may not know when, or what it will look like, but we have a God who promises to show up. We have a God who will come to us, and meet us where we are, so that we are not alone. We have a God who promises life, and life abundant, even when the brokenness of the world seems to be overwhelming. This is who we are waiting for, this is who is coming, this is who we are celebrating, this is who is here.



CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING

Church council minutes – November 9, 2022
The Council met on Wednesday evening,
November 9th, with opening devotions by Pastor Josh. Members present were Jill Hoffman, Greg Plath, Sharon Wolske, Lindsey and Buckley Reynolds, Ricker Olson and Pastor Josh Wyman. Pastor Josh's message was based on Philippians 3: 12-21, that Christ has made us his own, claimed us and is calling us.

The Secretary's report was approved, the motion made by Sharon and seconded by Greg. The Treasurer's report was also approved, the motion made by Greg and seconded by Sharon, and the request was made to put our account balances,

including the previous month's balances and also the amount in our savings. The motion

was passed. The Youth Committee reported that the youth will be helping with Christmas decorations, the Thanksgiving baskets and the Christmas program. The Music Committee has musicians lined up through March. Pastor Josh gave his report, stating that the confirmation class

has begun, as of last Sunday, meeting at 7:00 PM.

Old Business: Buckley Reynolds reported on the heating and cooling system for the church, having met with Klimate Heating & Control, and the cost was approved. The quote was for approximately \$15,000 total, with the furnace at \$5727.00 and the Air conditioning at \$9700.00. It was approved to go ahead with the updates. The Harvest Dinner was successful. and reports are still coming in on the Bazaar, Auction and Dinner items, and it is expected to be between \$4000 and \$5000. Bazaar items will remain on display for another week or two, for people to make purchases. Thank you to all who participated in this event. The Audit Committee, consisting of Liz, Robin, Mandy, and Cindy G. will have their report ready for the annual meeting. Jill will schedule a meeting of the Nominating Committee members (Jill, Liz, Dawn, Robin and Megan) in preparation for the annual meeting also.

Thanksgiving baskets will be distributed by the sponsor, the Lions' Club. on November 20th. At this time, there are about 10 families, requesting the baskets. The Christmas decorating schedule

is tentatively set for November 20th. We will check with Agnes Beddes regarding the Christmas baskets needed, and we will set up the "Angel Tree", with the items needed for the children in those families, so they each can have a "gift" for Christmas.

The Christmas program with the children will be held on December 18th. and the Christmas Eve service will take place on the 24th at 8:00 PM. There will not be a service on Christmas Day. Advent begins on November 27th, and we do not plan to have any midweek services. Pastor Josh has talked with our ecumenical partners, the Huntley Methodist church, etc., regarding Blue Christmas services, and no decision has been made as yet. Our

next meeting with the church at Hardin will be on January 4th, and we will need to plan for the Lenten service schedule, regarding midweek services. Any suggestions from the congregations will be helpful. Perhaps we can do one congregation on a Tuesday night, and the other on a Wednesday night. New Business: We have been trying to get volunteers to help with each

Sunday's services. Liz has a few ideas regarding that, and we will be working on that. Kristianne Wilson is on the Endowment Committee and has some thoughts on stewardship. The First Communion Class will be held, as we get a count on the numbers needed, and how often it will be held, and the times. A class for new members, and those who will be joining our church, will be held after the holidays, in late January or February. Sunday Service Attendants (offering counters) are Greg Plath for November 13th, Sharon Wolske for November 20th, Dawn Petty for November 27th, Sharon Wolske for December 4th, and Jill Hoffman for December 11th.

Our next Council meeting will be held on December 13th, at 7:00 PM, at Emmanuel Lutheran Church or another announced site. We will have a Christmas potluck, with Lindsey Reynolds as hostess, with the time and location to be announced. Our annual meeting will be held the last Sunday in January, the 29th. 
