Save the date: Christikon Benefit Auction is scheduled for April 23rd.



ECL CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES

Dec 14, 2022 Church Council Minutes

The Church Council met on Wednesday evening, December 14th, at the home of Lindsey and Buckley Reynolds. Members present were Pastor Josh, Jill Hoffman, Liz White, Dawn Petty, Sharon Wolske, Ricker Olson, Greg Plath and Lindsey and Buckley Reynolds. Pastor Josh opened with devotions from Isaiah 9: 2-7.

Standing Reports included the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved, motion made by Sharon and seconded by Greg. The Treasurer's report, given by Lindsey Reynolds, was approved; the motion made by Liz, seconded by Sharon. It had been suggested to put the balances in the monthly church newsletter, and that will be done.

The Youth Committee (Liz and Greg) are preparing the Christmas program for the 18th, and a possible bowling party this winter. The Music Committee (Jill and Pastor Josh) has been scheduled through March.

Pastor Josh reported on the type of services we have been having, and he wanted to know if that was agreeable, or if we wanted to change it to be more modern. The Council thought less ritual would be helpful, as we have had some new members, and it could be less formal. The Christmas Eve service will include the Sherseth's music.

Old Business: The heating and air conditioning equipment was discussed, and Buckley Reynolds has ordered and is waiting for some new equipment to update the system. Liz reported on the beef raffle, which has brought in #3400.00. The Audit Committee, led by Liz and Robin, is working on their report, and plan to have it ready the first week in January. The Nominating Committee, consisting in Jill, Liz, Robin, Megan and Dawn, will be working on their list in January, in preparation for the annual meeting.

The Christmas schedule is planned, and we will again have an Angel Tree, and Christmas baskets to be given out to those needy families who come to the food pantry. December 18th will be the time for the Children's Program, in place of our regular Sunday service. On Christmas Eve, Dec. 24th, there will be a service at 8:00 PM. There will not be a service on Sunday, Christmas Day. Pastor Josh has been discussing an ecumenical service with neighboring churches for Wednesday evening, December 21st, and it will be a Blue Christmas service, held here at Emmanuel at 7:00 PM.

Our next meeting with the American Lutheran Church in Hardin will be January 4th, and a schedule for the regular Sunday worships will be discussed. The Council thought we should continue with the same hourly schedule for Sundays that we now have. A schedule has to be made for Lenten services, and we could do a service on Tuesday or Thursday evenings. A class for new members, and their induction, will be held on February 19th. Luanne Super will no longer be doing the changing of the altar paraments but Maryann Morgenstern will take that over.

New Business: Preparations for the Annual Meeting will take place on the 13th or 14th of January. The annual meeting is planned for January 29th. Plans for new officers, annual budget, and technology will be discussed. We need to have streaming set up for the

basement area, with TV and computers, and Colter has recommended having a camera in the back of the church, in the area of the stained glass window. The costs for all this will be decided, as will the prices for new ceiling lighting in the sanctuary, along with the costs for the new ceiling, and what material will be used.

Sunday Service Attendants (offering counters, etc.) will be using the large vase in the back of the church for the offerings taken during the Sunday School Program, then on the 24^{th} for the 8:00 PM service, Sharon will count the offering; January 1^{st} , Ricker will count; January 8^{th} Dawn will count; and Liz will do the counting on January 15^{th} .

Ricker suggested replacing the large wooden cross on the lawn at the front of the church, as the wood is rotting in the ground, and it is unstable now. He will look into replacing it with a metal cross.

The next Council meeting will be held on January 11th at 7:00 PM at the church basement. The meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Thanksgiving, and eight baskets at Christmas, plus 20 gifts for children under the "Angel tree". Our special thanks to the Lions' Club for all they have done.


