The Council met on Wednesday evening at 7:00 PM. Present were Jill Hoffman, Liz White, Pastor Josh, Lindsey and Buckley Reynolds, Ricker Olson and Dawn Petty. Pastor Josh opened with devotions. The Secretary's minutes were approved, motion made by Liz, seconded by Buckley. The Treasurer's report was given and discussed. The motion to approve it was made by Liz, seconded by Buckley. The Youth Committee reported that the topics will be matched with the liturgy. and beginning on October 30th. Pastor Josh is working on the

Confirmation also. The Music Committee has their agenda scheduled for meetings on Wednesday nights, and Dawn Sherseth will be starting a choir, composed of adults and youth. Pastor Josh plans to have a Christmas Eve service at 8:00 PM

OLD BUSINESS: Phil White has been checking on the water analysis, ensuring that it is safe to drink.

The Community Garden needs to be totally harvested, and weeds pulled up, hoses removed, etc. for the winter.

The update on our office technology for the computer system is that it needs to be updated, and that topic will be brought up at our annual meeting in January. Colter has been working on the system, and it will be proposed at that meeting to upgrade our system.

Buckley Reynolds gave a report on the furnace and air conditioning for the church, and it was decided to wait until the annual meeting to have the congregation decide what should be done...as the total price for both would be around \$15,000.00, and we do have the funds to take care of it. Liz made a motion, seconded by Lindsey, to have a special meeting on October 30th to discuss this situation and inform the congregation.

Our annual Harvest Dinner will again be held on the lst Sunday in November, which is the 6th. Posters will be put up around the area, an ad will be placed in the Yellowstone County News, and there will also be a Bazaar and live auction. The meal will be served from 11:30 AM to 2:00 PM, and our menu will be the roast beef dinner again

The closing date for the raffle will be November 30th. and the meat will be available at the end of January of February.

SUNDAY SERVICE ATTENDANTS: offering counters will be Dawn P. on October 16th, Liz on October 23rd, and again on the 30th of October, Jill on November 6th, and Greg on November 13th. Our next Council meeting will be held on November 9th at 7:00 PM at the Church.


