The Pineview Quilters meet at Emmanuel at least once a month, to work on quilts in the church basement. The big tables down there are so helpful to spread the quilts out for tying, etc. The Pineview Quilters was organized in 1946, and has always included women from the area, and from various congregations, with the one purpose in mind, to make quilts for various needs: fire victims, lap robes for nursing homes and assisted living facilities, RiverStone, VA hospitals, etc. We always enjoyed each other's fellowship, and as our meetings and workdays became longer, we started bringing food to share. I see similarities, to the early church in the story of Acts, as with the disciples, it was composed of people from a wide variety of backgrounds, and ethnicities. The language of "fabric" brought us together and encouraged us to learn more about our communities.

In that first chapter of Acts, we don't see a group that looks destined to change the world, but as anyone, who has been a member of a quilt group (or any other kind of artist's group) can attest, there is power in that group itself. When I think about this quilt group, I realize that we all accomplished more together than we could have on our own. We made quilts that would cover a bed, sewed quilts filled with intricate stitches and designs, created quilts to be raffled off to raise money for various funds to benefit others, included quilts to be shipped overseas to needy people, all done while we enjoyed the companionship of each other.

Now let us relate this to the Holy Trinity: if we thought of the Trinity as a quilt group, I think it could transform our relationship with the Holy Spirit and God as the ultimate quilt designer, who invites and inspires us to contribute ideas, fabrics, thread, and efforts in God's work in the world. Now I see Jesus as one who comes to our tattered and torn quilt of existence to introduce us to new materials, offering fabrics, more interesting patterns, and vibrant colors, all stitched together with stronger threads than any we've had before. The Holy Spirit is a quilt group member, too. The Spirit is one who comes to us with support, accompaniment, and information about where our quilts should be entered, encouraging us to believe in our creative powers, even when we are less sure of ourselves. The Holy Spirit's wake-up call is an insistence that we can be better versions of ourselves. Many of Jesus' parables use images of work: work in a vineyard, in fields, as servants waiting for new masters, but in our day and age, work as a metaphor for life in the Kingdom of God doesn't really speak to the joy of living in that reality. Picturing the Trinity as a quilt group, with the Holy Spirit as the group's energizing and organizing force, can move us in that direction. We can be open to the gentle whispers of a new way of looking at the materials of our lives. We can have a daring vision, without knowing exactly how we will accomplish it. The Holy Spirit is here to help us with the work of that creation.

If we enlarge our thoughts about the Holy Spirit, and our ideas of what can be accomplished when we partner with the Spirit, we will see a transformation that began when the first disciples encountered the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Isn't that a better outcome than staying hidden in our houses? We can become communities that tell the story of God's love and share in God's work. We can help to reweave the fabric of our world---a fabric that is increasingly frayed, shredded and torn, but with potential for transformation and beauty.

That's the Great Commission, in quilting terms.

Acolyte Information and Training
following Worship
September 26th 11:15am

What is an Acolyte?

An **acolyte** is an assistant or follower assisting the celebrant in a religious service or procession. Acolyte, comes from the Greek akolouthos, meaning “server,” “companion,” or “follower”

In the Lutheran traditions, acolytes participate in the worship service by carrying a processional cross or crucifix, the word of God, lighting and extinguishing the altar candles, ringing the church bell to call the congregation to worship, and assist the presiding minister in presenting the Sacraments. The lighting of the altar candles in the worship service is a symbol of Jesus’ coming into the presence of the worshipping community. Before lighting the candles, the acolyte may bow at the altar out of respect. Before the extinguishing of the last altar candles, the acolytes relight their "candle lighter" and then process out into the narthex. This symbolizes that Jesus Christ is for all people everywhere. It also symbolizes the light of Jesus Christ going out into the world where believers are called to serve. Acolytes in the Lutheran tradition wear robes called albs.


