EMMANUAL LUTHERN CHURCH OCTOBER 2024





When we look at our readings this month, one clear thread stands out: worship is about more than a single moment; it's about how we respond to God in every season of our lives. It's about how we choose to trust Him, honor Him, and live out His calling, even when life doesn't go the way we expect.

Take, for example, the story of the Israelites in Exodus 32. While waiting for Moses to come down from Mount Sinai, the people grew restless and decided to take matters into their own hands by building a golden calf to worship. It's a stark reminder that worship isn't just about what we do when things are going well, but also about how we react in times of uncertainty and impatience. How often do we, like the Israelites, turn to distractions or quick fixes when we feel disconnected from God? Their story challenges us to consider whether our worship is something that stays rooted in God, even when answers seem delayed or life feels out of control.

In contrast, we have the story of Hannah in 1 Samuel 1, a woman who chose to bring her deepest pain and longing before God in prayer. She didn't hide her heartache or pretend to have it all together; instead, she laid it all before God, trusting that He heard her cries. And when her prayers were answered, her response was one of praise and gratitude, captured beautifully in her song of thanksgiving (1 Samuel 2:1-10). Hannah teaches us that worship isn't about pretending everything is perfect; it's about bringing our whole selves to God, trusting that He cares about our struggles just as much as our successes.

We see another layer of worship in the story of David in 2 Samuel 7. David wanted to build a grand temple for God, a place where He could dwell among His people. But God had different plans. He reminded David that He didn't need a building to prove His presence and instead promised to establish a lasting legacy through David's line. This moment shows us that worship isn't about what we can offer to God but recognizing and celebrating what God has already done for us. It's about trusting that God's plans are greater than our own and being open to the ways He might work in and through us.

Finally, in the story of Solomon's dedication of the temple in 1 Kings 5 and 8, we see a powerful example of how worship creates a space for God's presence in our lives. Solomon recognized that no building could contain God, and his prayer was that anyone—whether from Israel or from far-off lands—could come and experience God's grace and love. This reminds us that worship isn't confined to a specific place or moment. It's something that extends beyond the church, reaching into every aspect of our lives, homes, workplaces, and communities.

So, as we embrace this season of autumn, let's take a moment to ask ourselves: How can we make worship a part of our daily lives? How can we honor God not just with our voices on Sunday mornings but with our actions, words, and choices every single day? Worship can be found in how we treat our neighbors, how we serve our families, and how we respond to those in need. It's in the prayers we offer for one another, the kindness we show to a stranger, and the way we stand up for justice and compassion in our community.

Just as the seasons change, our lives are always shifting. But in every season, God invites us to worship Him—not just with our lips but with our whole lives. He calls us to trust in His presence, to celebrate His promises, and to share His love with the world around us.

May this season be one where we discover new ways to worship God, not just in our church services, but in every moment we're given.



Fall Retreats. We have retreats scheduled through mid-October. Start planning now to bring your group and enjoy fall in the mountains in 2024!


