For thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied, and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the Lord sends rain on the earth.

-1 Kings 17:14

In a world that feels more divided than ever, it's easy to fall into patterns of avoidance or hostility. We see it in our conversations, in our news feeds, and, if we're honest, even in our hearts. There's a growing temptation to retreat into the comfort of like-minded communities or to lash out at those we see as being on the "other side." We look across the divide and wonder, How did they get over there?

The prophet Elijah found himself in a similar place. He stood against Ahab and Jezebel, rulers who had led Israel far from its calling. His response? A dramatic, self-imposed drought—a punishment meant to prove just how wrong they were. For years, the land suffered, and Elijah, sure of his righteousness, waited for his enemies to break under the weight of his actions. But the real lesson came later, not in the act of judgment, but in an unexpected encounter.

When the drought left him with no water or food, God sent Elijah to Zarephath—enemy territory, the very place where the culture and worship he despised had originated. There, a widow was preparing her last meal before resigning herself and her son to starvation. She was, by all measures, part of the other side. And yet, Elijah was instructed to rely on her for survival.

Something profound happens in that moment. The drought—the consequence of Elijah's self-righteous indignation—had left both of them broken. And in their shared suffering, they sat at a table together. The widow, despite having so little, shared what she had. And in the act of breaking bread together, they found something deeper than their differences. The food never ran out. The water was sustained. The barrier between them dissolved—not because they had settled all their disagreements, but because they saw each other as people first.

This is where healing begins. Not in proving our point or waiting for the "other side" to admit their faults, but in recognizing that we cannot be whole without one another. The real power isn't in the drought—it's in the meal.

It's easier, of course, to stay in the drought, to choose distance and comfort over the hard work of reconciliation. But when we do, we miss out on the chance to see the other not as an opponent, but as a fellow child of God.

The world is pulling us apart, telling us to choose sides, to divide, to withhold grace. But we are a people of the table. We follow a Savior who invited tax collectors, zealots, and sinners to break bread together. A Savior who knelt to wash the feet of those who would betray Him. A Savior who, even on the cross, extended forgiveness.

So, as we continue through this season, may we resist the temptation of the drought. May we choose to sit, to listen, to share a meal. And in doing so, may we rediscover the hope, healing, and renewal that can only be found when we come together at the table.
