So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away;

see, everything has become new! -2 Corinthians 5:17

Lent begins in ashes. Each year, as we gather on Ash Wednesday, we hear the ancient words: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." We mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross, a reminder of our mortality, our need for God, and the ways we fall short. It is a solemn beginning, but ashes are not the end of the story. Because Lent is not a season of despair—it is a season where God is shaping us for something new.

From the ashes, we set out on a journey. A journey that will lead us through wilderness, selfexamination, and renewal—but ultimately, toward something greater. Because at the heart of Lent is the promise that God is not finished with us yet.

As we enter this season, we remember that transformation is rarely immediate. It is often slow, unfolding through small, intentional steps. When Jesus began His ministry, He didn't start by teaching in the synagogues or performing miracles. He began in the wilderness—a time of fasting, prayer, and preparation (Luke 4:1-13). It was there, in solitude and struggle, that He was formed for the work ahead. Lent invites us into that same space.

This is a season to pause, reflect, and listen for God's voice. It is an opportunity to step away from distractions and consider where God might be leading us. Some will use this time to let go of things that have become obstacles in their faith. Others will take on new practices that draw them closer to God—through prayer, generosity, or acts of love. However we approach it, Lent is not just about giving something up—it's about being open to what God is doing within us.

And yet, this journey is not just about personal reflection. It leads us somewhere. Lent inevitably carries us to the cross, where Jesus' love is fully revealed. The cross is not just a symbol of suffering—it is a place of surrender, where Jesus offers everything in love. It is a reminder that real growth often requires letting go—letting go of pride, fear, or anything that keeps us from seeing and loving others as Christ does. But the story does not end there. Lent does not leave us in the wilderness, and it does not leave us at the cross. It carries us forward to the empty tomb. To resurrection. To new life.

Even before Jesus set His face toward Jerusalem, He gave His disciples a glimpse of what was to come. On the mountain of Transfiguration, His glory was revealed, a foretaste of the resurrection (Luke 9:28-36). That moment was a reminder that this season of fasting, prayer, and reflection is leading us somewhere—that even in the struggle, God is preparing us for something greater.

And that is the promise of Lent. That God is not finished with us. That the ashes are just the beginning. That what we were is not all we are meant to be. So as we step into this season, may we embrace it fully. May we allow ourselves to be changed, renewed, and shaped by God's love. May we trust that even in the wilderness, even at the cross, God is leading us toward something greater.

Lent is not about what we give up—it is about who God is calling us to become.

From ashes to resurrection, may this be a season of renewal.
