
EMMANUAL LUTHERN CHURCH OCTOBER 2025





"From him the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love."

-Ephesians 4:16

The things that last in this world are rarely the work of one person. They're the work of people pulling together, each bringing what they can, and trusting that it adds up to something bigger. We see it in families who find a way through hard times, in neighbors who show up for each other, in communities that keep going not because one person does everything but because many people do what they can. The power comes from being in it together.

The same is true for the church. Sometimes in worship planning, we talk about the word "liturgy". It sounds formal, but it simply means "the work of the people." And that's exactly what worship is, something shared. It isn't the work of one or two who stand up front, but the shared offering of the whole body. When a greeter hands you a bulletin at the door, when someone steps forward to read the prayers, when bread and wine are carried to the table, when another pair of hands passes the offering plate, when treats are brought for coffee time, those things don't happen by themselves. And they're not just chores on a list. They're the Spirit working through us, making sure that what we share here is shaped by many voices and many hands.

Paul calls this being the body of Christ. Eyes and ears, hands and feet, all parts belonging, all parts needed. And the truth is that your role here matters. This congregation is not whole without you. God has given you gifts that no one else can bring in quite the same way, and when you share them, the whole body is strengthened. Whether it's teaching, serving, listening, praying, lending a hand, or simply showing up faithfully week after week, your presence carries weight. God has a purpose for you in this community, and through you, Christ is made known.

Because your role matters, it may also mean that God is inviting you into something new. To try something new in this community of faith. Maybe that means lending your voice in worship, or serving in a role you've never considered. Maybe it looks like offering encouragement to someone who needs it, or showing up in a way that stretches you. However it comes, these invitations are part of how God shapes the church. Through many people bringing their gifts together so that Christ's love can be known among us.

That's what makes the church who we are. Not a single program or a single person, not one big event or one shining moment, but the steady faithfulness of God's people gathered, serving, praying, and showing up together. This congregation is who it is because of you, because of the way God's Spirit is alive in your lives and because of the way you bring those gifts into this community.

So as this season turns, remember that you are part of something bigger than yourself. You are a member of Christ's body, and your gifts, your prayers, your presence, they matter more than you know. Together, by God's Spirit, we embody Christ's love in this place and beyond.

Fall Retreats scheduled through late October. Start planning now to bring your group and enjoy fall in the mountains in 2026!



Pastoral Report – Pastor Josh provided a copy of his Pastoral Report for us to read. September 29th, Linda Troyer will cover our church service while he is out of town. Melissa Walsh with Basil & Bloom wants to do another free community dinner to assist with funds for our matching Town Pump grant with the food pantry funds. Date TBD. 10/5 Big Sky Chorus will be out during service to lead/assist with our music during church. Confirmation Handbook presented to the council.

Youth Committee – Confirmation and Youth Sunday to resume. If your child is interested in helping with the youth Sunday on the first Sunday, please reach out to Jill Hoffman. We planned a "watch party" for our Homecoming Parade. We will serve a few snacks and drinks and allow anyone to join us for a great place to watch the parade and a chance for some fellowship. We also talked about maybe partaking in a "truck or treat" the day of Halloween. This would be a fast stop by for the kids in the neighborhood before going out for the night trick or treating. If you would like to donate some candy or goodies, please reach out to a council member.

Old business:

Storm/Insurance Update – Not many updates as we are waiting for the insurance and the adjustors to complete their end of each of the portions of the adjustment. The sheetrock has been removed downstairs. We have had questions from the insurance on the previous storm damage that we are also working through. They are asking for proof of what was done and we are working to provide those. ServePro is still on the schedule to get their portion done for the abatement (carpet in the fellowship portion and I believe some items in the kitchen.)

King of Glory donated us a gift of \$2000 just because they knew we needed it and we are very grateful! That check was deposited into the building fund. KOG also suggested that we enter into their grant application for a possible grant of \$5000 more to be used towards our building restoration. Pastor Josh had the application for review and would submit the application right after the meeting to meet the deadline. Prayers that they accept our application as that \$5k will be very helpful with our needs!

We spoke of the Congregation Feedback Committee and Kristianne presented a lot of information. She reached out to a few other Lutheran Churches and she is calling her work "Creation of Connections" and will report more as she gets more information. Kristianne feels that we do a good job with our outreach

but wants more. She suggested we reach out to new members and visitors and would like to find create something to get more feedback about what makes people come to church. She found a survey online and found that most members (other churches answers) want a connection. We need to explore "their" purpose. She also said her that personal outreach was the best way to identify ways to connect with them. Connection Cards in the pews would be a good way to have our members openly reach out without having to single out anyone. Kristianne volunteered to create a connection card for review in our next meeting. We also want to move forward with Jill's idea to have a "welcome bag" for the visitors. Something in hard copy showing what our church does like a pamphlet or something of that nature and maybe a treat or something kid friendly if they have young children.

New Business:

Harvest Dinner – we will have to see where the remodel is at to know if this will be possible this year. We also discussed seeing if we could possibly move this to another location or perhaps do this in the spring of 2026. More information to follow.
